

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NEW YORK – It's five weeks into the season and still too early to tell who is for real. It is enough of a sample size, however, to cause panic and over-exuberance, and everything in-between, in fanbases around the league. It's not too early to tell which teams are in serious trouble and – in a couple of cases – which of those are unlikely to pull out of their early dive. It is a little harder to tell if those teams that are off to great starts have it in them to maintain the pace over the long haul, because that long haul doesn't come into play until the number of weeks reaches double-digits. Nevertheless, in the age of social media, the capacity of platforms to generate instant crowd consensus have fans and media not just living in the moment, but unable to see past the moment and grasp the bigger picture. The fanbases certainly have a lot to say about what just happened and tend to extrapolate whatever that was as holding true for the remainder of the season, perhaps forever.

So, I decided to take the "temperature" of fanbases and beat writers across the league, within the context of their histories, based on the local media, social media and *YouTube* buzz, to measure where they are now, less than one-third, but more than one-fourth of the way through the season (damn 17-game sked!). It will be fun to compare the state of the fanbases now with their future condition at more than the two-thirds, but less than the three-quarters mark, around Week Eleven (damn 17-game sked!).

SURVEY SAYS...!

BILLTOWN BATS (2-3, coming off a loss): There is a schism in the fanbase between old Assassins fans in Las Vegas and new Bats fans in Pennsylvania. The former group continues to wear Assassins gear at home games and pickets the stadium before and after games demanding that the team remain in Las Vegas. The latter group has organized at the grassroots level using the slogan, "Bring the Bats Home," even though home hasn't been built yet. This group proposes to alternate home games between Heinz Field in Pittsburgh and Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia while the new stadium planned for Williamsport is being built. Lost in this fan war is meaningful discourse about the performance of the football team on the field, which has fallen below expectations so far. Each side blames the other for the team's current woes. The embarrassing loss to the Pats this week just added fuel to the fire. SENTIMENT: Negative / Angry

BROOKIN HAWKS (1-4, coming off a loss): It is as if Brooklin fans and local writers know how lucky they are to have a pro football team at all. There has been little ill-feeling expressed toward the players or their coach as the team undergoes its worst five-week start of the Tom Jones Era. In fact, the underlying optimism that "Tom will turn things around" has me reflecting on how appropriate the name was for their original home park. Helpful hints abound on Twitter about how Tom can get that done – all offered without acrimony – such as taking the pressure off **Derek Carr** by running more with **Austin Ekeler**, or deploying more multiple-receiver sets to take the heat off **DeAndre Hopkins**. All of these are sensible suggestions. Brooklin seems a happy place. SENTIMENT: **Positive / Hopeful**

BRUXELLES BOMBERS (3-2, coming off a win): Interest in the Bombers inside the capitol of the EU has waned considerably since the pandemic. The prospects of another losing season worse than last year affected the gate during the team's recent three-game home stretch, when they failed to sellout a game. Belgians are more concerned about the cost of fuel and rising inflation than they are about the Bombers. Social media activity relating to the team in Belgium is down, as are sales of *Duvel*. Belgian fans blame coach and GM **Kenny Main** for the team's current state – trading both **Travis Kelce** and **Darren Waller** in the same year registered even on Europeans as lacking reason and strategic vision. Interestingly, the most animated discussion originates from Samoa, the team's former home. Pacific Islanders seem to have taken to **Elijah Mitchell** as the team's new hope and think the Bombers will make the playoffs: **SENTIMENT**: **Neutral / Indifferent / Delusional**

BUDAPEST NORTH STARS (5-0, coming off a win): The combination of winning back-to-back championships and the intense marketing efforts of **Darrin Jones**, that have involved embracing Hungarian culture and falsifying football history, have resulted in the emergence of the most rabid fanbase in the EFL. The North Stars are everywhere in Hungary, not just Budapest, where a myth has formulated around American-style football being actually invented in Hungary by **Attila the Hun** in the 5th century as a strategy game for his military field commanders. The *True Hungarian Football Society*, boasting over 2,000 members, has propped up an entire historiography on the subject. Name a platform, Hungarians are on it talking about the North Stars. **Darrin Jones** is a "son of Hungary," **Aaron Rodgers** is a national hero, and fans are in love with **Justin Jefferson**, who they call **Szellem**, Hungarian for "ghost," because nobody can catch him. As the North Stars embark on a two-week road trip, the main topic of fan discussion is whether or not the team will ever lose another game. **SENTIMENT**: **Supremely Confidant / Fanatical / Obnoxious**

BUFFALO DERAILERS (1-4, coming off a loss): The fanbase and most of the local media is unified in wanting to get rid of **Daryl Brothers** as the team's coach, but are divided on how best to achieve that without also losing the team he brought to Buffalo to another market. Buffalo fans fear losing the team. Diplomatic suggestions that Brothers should focus on building the roster rather than coaching it are built on the artificial premise that he has a keen eye for talent and that Xs and Os are beneath him. Good try! So far, those calls have fallen on deaf ears, as the Derailers' Owner/GM/Coach wants it all, and his close inner circle, including his brothers Darryl (two r's) and Derrick, support him. Buffalo football fans are accustomed to bad luck and underachievement, but even they are losing patience. Unable to penetrate the skull of the team's owner, they are beginning to turn on **Lamar Jackson** and **Aaron Donald** for failing to turn the team around. The only thing they seem to look forward to is the tailgate. **SENTIMENT**: **Negative / Pessimistic / Afraid**

CHARLESWOOD PATRIOTS (1-4, coming off a win): Patriots fans have always been the politest and the least expressive of EFL fanbases since the very beginning. The only time they truly revolted was when Jason Findlay traded Peyton Manning in 2014 as part of the Pats' first deliberate "tankathon." So, it is not surprising that fan chatter continues at a resigned but even keel, focusing on the incremental development of Kenny Pickett and the disappearance of Alvin Kamara as a factor in the offence. The presence of All-Pro tight end Travis Kelce is a source of pride, considering he came at virtually no cost, but he is frequently mentioned in theoretical trade scenarios in order to continue the rebuild. The win over Billtown did not alter the overall tone of resignation. A small but vocal minority, unhappy with the roller coaster rides of the past 8 years, has expressed disgust with the ownership, wondering if fans should be rooting for Virden this year, instead, "since we're the same team." SENTIMENT: Neutral / Ambivalent / Resentful

CHINO CONVICTS (2-3, coming off a loss): This is a nasty fanbase at its core, but one also capable of lifting the team with spells of fanatical devotion. Its dark side came out following the injury to **Christian McCaffrey** with a meme of the running back playing wheelchair football with the heading 'Traded to Wheelchair Football League.' A viral tweet called for the return of **Quinton Spain**, the secondary piece in the trade that brought **Darnell Mooney** to the team. Mooney has not bonded with the fanbase and is the object of scorn in the prison seats of The Big House, as the real convicts bare their posteriors mooning his arrival on the field. The Spartans picked up **Tariq Woolen** with the draft pick they received for Mooney, worsening the online vitriol. The three-game losing streak has made fans surly and put more pressure on **Dak Prescott**, who wilted under pressure against Virden, prompting a strange meme of Prescott in a dress fainting at a Victorian tea party. The fans see a golden opportunity to take control of the West slipping away and it makes them very angry. **SENTIMENT**: **Negative / Abusive**

COBB COUNTY COYOTES (1-4, coming off a loss): The barrage of criticism coming from football fans in Marietta, GA is the kind only a fanbase spoiled by back-to-back Cinderella seasons would make. Talk of being "Georgia's Team" has stopped. Ryan Tannehill has gone from being a future Hall-of-Famer to being a journeyman "bum" in the eyes of fans after throwing three picks against the Wrecking Balls this week. Even coach Eron Osman, venerated as a "football genius" as recently as this training camp, is being called out for his decision-making, both on and off the field. The only player worth keeping, according to the fans, is left tackle Tristan Wirfs. They are now ready to "tear it all down," apparently not having realized that the Coyotes already tore it all down and that is why they are in the state they are. This may be the most out-of-touch fanbase in all of sports. SENTIMENT: Negative / Outraged / Clueless

COWTOWN CORN KINGS (3-2, coming off a win): Social media chatter in Cowtown is muted, given that the town is located within that strange 'Historic Zone' in the Province of Ontario, where modern technological conveniences are available, but slow to catch on. Local radio talk shows remain the most popular form of sports gossip, with the local truck stop a close second. Fans in Cowtown were disappointed with the loss to Cobb County, but remain convinced after the win over the Blue Eagles that "with TJ back" the team can "make some noise." The principal topic of conversation remains the quarterback position, as it has been ever since the end of Joe Flacco's heyday. Fans are concerned that Davis Mills is being paid almost triple the salary of starter, Jimmy Garoppolo. They understand that Jimmy G is out of favour with the owner, but think the situation is "a little queer" nonetheless. (Ed. Note: people in Cowtown don't have a common word for 'gay,' so "queer" is used in its original sense here) SENTIMENT: Positive / Patient / Optimistic

DURHAM THUNDER LIZARDS (5-0, coming off a win): Durham fans are accustomed to winning in the regular season, so all the *Twitter* talk at the moment revolves around whether or not what they see on the field in Weeks 1 thru 17 will translate into playoff success. As a result, any tiny imperfection in the team's performance is amplified in the eyes of the media and fans as "something they will have to correct if they want to win the championship." With the Thunder Lizards currently ranked no.1 in the AP Power Rankings, and in the top 5 in the most meaningful statistical categories, it is difficult to find anything to fix. However, the persnickety Durham fanbase has focused in on the 17th ranked third down conversion rate on offence as "something they will have to correct if they want to win the championship." That, and the inability to stop **Kirk Cousins** on 4th down, have the fanbase tied up in knots. There clearly will be no joy in Durham until they win, or at least appear in, a Championship. SENTIMENT: **Neutral / Critical**

EAST ELMHURST IRISH (3-2, coming off a loss): Like with any New York-based franchise, the Irish fans' default expectation is Championship – if not this year, then next year because of improvements this year. Archbishop Thomas Malloy has done a pretty good job assembling a roster to compete at the league's highest level, but as with all great football plans, the plan can all be undone by the quarterback. Fans in Queens are zeroing in on Carson Wentz as the weak link in this would-be champion, now and in the foreseeable future. They have not yet blamed the GM and coach for selecting him, but are peeved that they went "all-in" by refusing to sign a back-up. If the Irish fans could call for the back-up QB, they would; there just isn't one available. So, the entire focus of the fanbase right now is on Wentz and his imperfections, and they expect that if they boo him enough, things will improve. They have not yet caught on to the poor play of the defence the past two weeks, but when they do: watch out! SENTIMENT: Neutral / Demanding

ERIEAU CADILLAC (4-1, coming off a win): It is tough to measure the sentiment of a fanbase so small, but the detectable social media traffic and the content of local sports radio talk shows reveals that the Cadillac fans we know about are in love with *Kyler Murray* and *Myles Garrett* and excited about the prospect of winning at least as many games as they lose. That's right, fans in Erieau, and those nearby environs that gravitate toward it, are not even contemplating playoffs yet – they are thrilled for the moment to be the most powerful spoilers in the league. The win over Chino brought particular glee to the Cadillac faithful, not just because of its drama, but because it came against one of the league's storied franchises – the original EFL Champions. A thread on Twitter dubbed 'Cadillac for All' diverged from discussion about this week's win over Brooklin to controversy over the lack of gender-neutral bathrooms at Kelly-Burke Field. *SENTIMENT*: **Positive / Thankful / Inclusive**

GEORGIA GLADIATORS (2-3, coming off a loss): The Gladiators are on to their third home base in the State of Georgia after spending last year in Pittsburgh. Their fan footprint is large but diffused. Having not had a winning season since 2018, and no championship, they are not exactly ideal material for gaining a broad following. Yet, the Gladiators are popular among those who may liked the Steelers and the Falcons at some point in the distant past. Their pedigree as one of the original franchises also works in their favour. The aggressive power play by the Coyotes, backed by the Georgia Legislature, to kick the Glads out of the State alienated those traditional Glads supporters who make up most of the State of Georgia outside of Marietta. One can't just cancel a large following in such a high-handed fashion. So, despite the appearance of another losing season, Glads fans are raring to support their team. Gladiator fans on social media and call-in talk shows do the positive spin for the team, not the other way around. The switch to Tua after just two games created some fan dissension – more due to the way it was handled – but the desire to not appear disunited in the face of arrogant Coyote supporters, has most Glads fans on board with it now – at least publicly. SENITMENT: Positive / Collaborative / United

IOWA CITY (3-2, coming off a loss): The opening of the Iowa City Superplex, nicknamed the "Fergy Dome" by the fans, is a positive distraction for a fanbase sharply divided in its view of the team's coach and current youth movement. Urbanites based in Des Moines, Cedar Rapids and Iowa City do not trust coach **Deron Redding** to oversee the rebuild. They point to the fact that the team is winning as proof that Redding is making a mess of things and cannot be trusted. They want him fired. Rural Iowans on the contrary are delighted by the spirit shown by the Cubs' "young'uns." They believe that the best way to rebuild a team is to "teach them how to win!" and, if they win, "what's the problem?" Debate now swirls around whether the Cubs should go all-in and trade **Russell Wilson**. Rural fans think he will play until he's 40, like **Tom Brady**; the urbanites think the Cubs should part ways with him while they can and roll the dice in the draft. One thing the fans on both sides of the divide agree on, though, is that the Superplex is indeed "super." **SENTIMENT**:

Neutral / Divided / Quarrelsome

NEW JERSEY WRECKING BALLS (5-0, coming off a win): Follow only Wrecking Balls fan commentary on social media you would never know their team is undefeated. New Jerseyans, accustomed to failure most tragic, are in disbelief. They expect things to fall apart any moment, so their chatter revolves around predicting the when and how of that moment. Online comments after just one scoreless quarter this week against Cobb County ranged from pessimistic to outrage as fans pondered the potential humiliation of a loss to the woeful Coyotes. When it ended in a Jersey shutout and 27-point victory, a trending thread started by influencer @AshburyJoe lamented how the team had been too conservative and had relied too much on their defence, and that that would cost them if they made the playoffs. (IF they made the playoffs!) Fans who express cautious optimism that the team is for real this year are reminded by this same @AshburyJoe that the Wrecking Balls have had the easiest schedule in the league to this point, and not to get too excited. The fans continue to criticize traditional scapegoat, David Montgomery, despite his 5.4 yards per carry average and no.2 ranking among rushers, claiming that teams are focusing on Matt Stafford. Yet, these same fans are also critical of Stafford for a relative lack of production given the support of Montgomery. It seems the Wrecking Balls can't win for winning. SENTIMENT: Negative / Skeptical

OSHAWA PINK PANTHERS (0-5, coming off a loss): On top of having to endure the discontent of their own fans, the Pink Panthers are constantly subjected to a hail of criticism and ridicule from Aurorans, who still follow the team that brought their city three Gale Sayers Trophies. #PinkPanthers=ZeroHorsepower is the hashtag used by ex-Mustangs fans to categorize messages poking fun at or belittling the coaching of **Scott Dennis** and the play of the Oshawa incarnation of the team. Oddly enough, the attacks on the coach and the team by fans in Aurora may be the only thing keeping Dennis from having to go into protective custody. Oshawa fans aren't happy by a long shot, but they resent being mocked by their snobby northern neighbours. They are inclined to make excuses for the native Oshawa-an. Yet, there is no hiding from these new fans the fact of an unbalanced offence and the appearance of a defence going through the motions. Who can be blamed for this other than the coach? In the view of the fans in Oshawa, **Matt Ryan** is the main problem. Calls for **Mason Rudolph** are getting louder. The fans are so desperate after getting mauled by Pickering, that even a single win could dramatically swing the mood. **SENTIMENT**: **Negative / Defensive / Desperate**

PEG CITY CRUSADERS (2-3, coming off a win): Sharing an entire province that has a population less than that of San Antonio with three other pro football teams can make it tough for that team to generate a loyal fanbase, especially when that team is the last one in and coming off a one-win season. Nevertheless, a small but vocal clutch of free-spirited Winnipeggers have adopted this team as their own, reveling in their uniqueness. The team gets its own little corner of the sports page of the Winnipeg Free Press while garnering hardly a mention in either of the two Charleswood newspapers – the Charleswood Sun and the Charleswood Banner – each one owned by one of **Jason's Findlay**'s twin sisters. On the whole, the city is indifferent to the Crusaders, while Blue Bombers fans envy their stadium, True North Field. #CrimsonCrusade is the hashtag to search Twitter for comments on the team. From the limited information available one can piece together a picture of a cautiously optimistic fan group, very proud of their team's defence and believing that last

year's 1st round pick, *Mac Jones* can eventually lead them to the promised land. They really want to beat Charleswood for past and current slights and are looking forward to their meeting next week. *SENTIMENT*: **Positive / Optimistic / Vengeful**

PICKERING SPARTANS (3-2, coming off a win): In the extreme world of Spartan fandom there is never a down moment. The fans are either fanatically pumped up or hysterically unhinged. They take their cue from the '300 Spartans' fan club, as insane a fan grouping as one will find in sports, whose motto 'Never Surrender' is applied equally to all fans as well as the players. Ravings on social media and by pro-Spartan YouTubers (of which there are many, for some reason) reflect a general state of pumped-up fanaticism after the Spartans won their third game in a row. Fans have taken to the **Jalen Hurts** offence more than the quarterback himself, appreciating the run-first, grind 'em down approach the team has adopted with him under center. Pickering fans love to see their team administer a punishing beat down and running the ball successfully more than they pass does just that. I wonder if they will be as stoked when the team needs to come from two scores behind late in the game. **SENTIMENT**: **Toxically Positive / Intense / Savage**

SCARBOROUGH BLUE EAGLES (0-5, coming off a loss): As the Blue Eagles play their third season at the renamed Eagle's Nest (the old Wolverine's Den) located in Toronto's Exhibition Place, with plans for a new facility in Scarborough terminally stalled by red tape and political interference, the fanbase has spread to the downtown core and west end of Toronto. All this has achieved is more widespread disgruntlement. While fans were patient during the first two seasons with *Joe Burrow* at quarterback, with each passing loss they become surlier and surlier. Chris Dickinson was permanently blamed long ago for any and all of the team's past and future problems, but very recently a portion of that blame is leaking to the third-year signal-caller. Once lionized, even before taking a snap, Burrow is now being greeted by caustic cries of "BOOO-RROW" by the not-so-faithful fans. Dickinson, who had enjoyed a period of relative safety as the fans had only quietly resented him during the Burrow development window, has resumed taking personal protective measures due to his culpability in failing to bring in new weapons and for his perceived interference in the decisions of head coach Kyle Shanahan. Then there is the schism between the original "Scarberian" fans and the newcomers in Etobicoke, who dislike each other and blame the other for the dark cloud that hangs over the franchise. SENTIMENT: Negative / Belligerent

SEATTLE PILOTS (1-4, coming off a loss): Fans in Seattle have no expectations for a franchise that has never had a winning season in its history, dating back to 2012 in Mission Viejo. They went through the five stages of grief over the first five years of **Mitchell Gangwish**'s tenure as GM and coach and now they are in some kind of suspended state where they don't know whether to get mad again or just walk away. In the meantime, they seem to find the team humorous – a wild card, a Joker in the EFL deck. Fans don't know what to expect from week-to-week, down to who will play quarterback. The few serious fans still left in Seattle want to see **Trey Lance** on the field, but most seem to like the mystery and the randomness of the weekly coin flip to see if Thing 1 or Thing 2 gets the start at quarterback. The injury to fan-favourite **Khalil Mack** has shaken what little hope diehards had for a Cinderella run of the kind witnessed in 2020, when they set a franchise record with 7 wins. Now they take it one game at a time. **SENTIMENT**: **Neutral / Passive**

SEBASTIAN SWORDFISH (2-3, coming off a loss): **Russ Lemmon** is a polarizing figure in Florida football fandom. Where one stands on the issue of his coaching determines one's love or loathing for the Swordfish. Lemmon is too well-connected in Sebastian to be detested in the heart of the team's fanbase. In fact, he still enjoys celebrity status in the city, has powerful friends in the State of Florida, and has acquired somewhat of a cult following among nutbars on the fringe of football analytics. Some claim he is a play-calling and game-managing genius who created an offensive powerhouse out of marginal talent, made the playoffs against the odds, and nearly embarrassed Budapest in the quarter finals last year. Then there are those – like me – who think he does more harm than good, view last season as an outlier, and would like to see him retire and enjoy his fortune, made when he found the rest of the sunken Spanish treasure fleet of 1715 off the east coast of Florida. While fans took the good with the bad last year (when the good was outweighing the bad) this year the gambles aren't paying off so well. High expectations have been downgraded to caution as appalled fans witness lunatic-grade 4th down gambles from almost any place on the field in questionable circumstances. The coach's antics have become larger than the team itself, and many fans from the outside the city are getting antsy. SENTIMENT: **Neutral / Worried / Divided**

TWIN CITIES TRIUMPH (4-1, coming off a win): Minnesota has a proud football tradition. Triumph fans are a passionate and demanding group. Since the beginning, the Triumph have been fully backed by the entire State as well as neighbouring North and South Dakota. The team is aptly named. The hot-blooded, headstrong coach of the Triumph demands nothing less than victory. When he delivered a Championship in 2016, the State that had endured four Super Bowl losses by the Vikings in the 70s rejoiced. **Guy Williams** accumulated a lot of goodwill currency over his first eight seasons as head of the Triumph. Then, he went and blew a good portion of it over the past two seasons of team upheaval. From his uncharacteristic tolerance of a team cancer in **Antonio Brown**; to dropping off a cliff unexpectedly in 2020 to "earn" the first overall pick in the draft; to his refusal to play that no.1 pick until the final two games of his rookie year and in doing so not even acknowledge it was **Trevor Lawrence** on the field; to the baffling decision to start turnover machine **Jameis Winston** this year; all of it shook the foundations of the fans' faith in the coach who could have run for Governor after 2016 and won in a landslide. But the Triumph are now 4-1, their franchise quarterback is finally starting (albeit due to injury), and the coach looks like he is coaching to win again. Amazingly, the turmoil of the past two years has vanished and fans are once again flocking in droves to Wilhalla Stadium to cheer on the Triumph. It's a record built on a weak schedule, but nobody is talking about that. Right now, it's 2016 all over again! **SENTIMENT: Positive / Zealous / Clamorous**

VIRDEN VIOLATORS (4-1, coming off a win): Virden fans are an odd mix of conservative pioneer stock, spoiled progeny of "old oil money," Brandon residents, Dakota First Nations peoples, eastern Saskatchewan farmers and disaffected punks from Winnipeg attracted by the violence and comic-book grimness of mind inherent in the team's green-skinned slasher "Vlad" logo and *Hooded Hangman*

mascot. The team's main beat writer is named after an aristocratic French pervert and the team itself plays in an old refurbished Victorian Era insane asylum. There is hardly any unified fan sentiment to measure. The punks, Goths and Death Metal heads who flock to *TERRORDOME* do so regardless of how the team is performing. Conservative rural folk from Virden and environs are just glad to be able to do something after church on Sunday, as long as the aforementioned metal heads stay in the end zone 'mosh pits.' Dakota First Nations fans started showing up in year-two of the franchise and nobody knows why. They sit together to watch the games – filling entire sections – bang war drums, chant, cheer, and drink. They leave together in a fleet of buses and nobody sees them again until the next game. Right now, this eclectic fanbase is unified in its worship of *Patrick Mahomes* and hatred of the Patriots; the latter being ironic given the backroom connections between the team's owners. *SENTIMENT*: **Positive / Devoted / Vengeful**

YORK EXCALIBURS (3-2, coming off a win): This is the "No Excuses" year for Jay Hammond and his quarterback, Tom Brady. Veiled suggestions that Brady has rested on his laurels for too long are sprinkled here and there through social media threads, blog and media reports. Insinuations that Hammond is hungover or drunk on the sideline are more prevalent than ever after the team's Week One fiasco against Brooklin. Fans and media analysts look at the roster and see enough talent to succeed. They look at the quarterback and coach as both capable, in theory, of getting the most out of it. Expectations are high. It is time to succeed! So, it has been a bit of a roller-coaster through five weeks, with the fans reacting accordingly. Disgust and calls for Hammond's head after Week One; redemption and drunken jubilation after Week Two; disappointment and bitterness after Week Three; relief and reassurance after Week Four; confidence and hope after Week Five. Fan support is vocal and trending in the right direction, but behind the nervous smiles and false bravado lingers doubt that the team will deliver in a highly competitive division. SENTIMENT: Neutral / Hopeful / Doubtful

I hope you enjoyed my snapshot of fan feeling across the league through five weeks, in the context of the histories of the teams. Some of this sentiment will carry on, some of it will change, possibly dramatically, as the season evolves. I'll check in again as the playoff races heat up. Now, let's take a closer look at this week's big upset...

FOR BAT-TER OR WORSE

Billionaire industrialist, philanthropist, playboy, and now owner of the Billtown Bats, **Stephen Michael**, never saw himself as a football coach while growing up in Williamsport, Pennsylvania and later, as he was building his industrial empire, donating to noble causes worldwide, and jet-setting as the Forbes' List's most eligible bachelor. But when you have the world by its tail, have succeeded in every business endeavour, boast both a Wharton Doctorate in Applied Economics and a PhD in Physics and Astronomy from the University of Pennsylvania, and a close friend bets that you can't coach a football team, that's when plans change.

"My friend, Archer from Chestnut Hills [Ed. Note; a wealthy neighbourhood in Philadelphia] put me up to it," Michael explained recently in an interview with **Rich Eisen** on the EFL Network. "A bunch of us were in Las Vegas a couple of years ago, for some reason, and the Assassin's Den had just opened. Some of us got an invite from the Adelsons to join them in their private box to watch a game. I think it was against Peg City. Sheldon shared with us how difficult it had been to find the right coach for his team. I think I quipped something like, 'how hard can it be to coach 12 guys to slam into 12 other guys on every play?' Of course, I was corrected about the number of players – it is actually 11 on each side. Anyway, my comment provoked a bit of controversy. Some of the football people in the room took exception and explained to me that game plans had become very complex over the years."

"They certainly have," Eisen commented. "This isn't Pop Warner's game anymore."

"Ahh ha, yes, it is...I mean no, it isn't," Michael laughed nervously, before continuing. "Anyway, Archer remembered that conversation in the owner's box in Las Vegas and got in touch with me when he saw the ad for an EFL team for sale. 'Hey Batty' – that's what my school buddies call me – 'Hey Batty,' he said. 'Here's your chance to prove me wrong!' Archer had been one of those who thought coaching was much more difficult than it looked. He bet that if I bought the team, took total control over it and hired myself as coach, I would grind the team into the ground in one season. 'It's supposed to be a playoff team, I hear,' he added. 'Bet you can't make the playoffs with it.' Well, I couldn't just back away from that, especially after he vowed to mow the lawn of my estate in Grampian Hills with a Budding push mower for an entire year if he was wrong. Let's just say my lawn is pretty big. So, I bought the team and here we are. I'm up for the challenge!"

That interview was given shortly before the start of the season. Nobody then knew what to expect. Many assumed that Michael would hire a coaching "consultant" and pretend to coach the team. Apparently, however, being true to his bet, he decided to go solo.

Heading into Week Five, the early reviews of the Bats' performance had been mixed. Coach Michael had garnered praise from Bombers' coach, **Kenny Main**, after the Bats fell to his team in Bruxelles. The beleaguered Main had been in a giddy and generous mood after that game, perhaps sensing his team would exceed expectations after a 2-0 start, thus saving his skin for another year. Neutral observers were not so impressed with the Bats' showing against a team they were expected to handle easily.

Sitting at 2-2, coming off an embarrassing loss to Georgia at home, the most recent of these mixed reviews was harshly critical. According to **Steve Cyprinidae** of the *Las Vegas Review-Journal*, still covering the team while it resides in the desert, the Bats "were not ready to play mentally." The game plan was "haphazard." The sideline was "disorganized." He finished off with this zinger: "Coach Michael was schooled by a veteran coach, coaching vastly inferior talent with a developmental quarterback. He looked overwhelmed in the moment."

Unlike sycophantic reporters in Williamsport, who all want to curry favour with a wealthy owner in order to obtain privilege, who effusively praise the Bats' coach's "novel innovations" and blame the players for all mis-steps, the hard-nosed Cyrprinidae doesn't pull his punches about what he sees as "an appalling experiment."



Michael Manor, located in Grampian Hills, Williamsport, PA, home of billionaire industrialist and Billtown Bats owner, **Stephen Michael**. Apparently bored with running Michael Enterprises, the native of Williamsport purchased the Las Vegs Assassins, changed its name and appointed himself head coach. Although he has no coaching experience, he claims he is "up for the challenge."

Cyrprinidae may also be bitter that in a year or two he will lose a premium pro writer's beat and be back to writing about the Las Vegas Lights of the USL and the Las Vegas Aces of the WNBA. Bullying the new owner into selling his team back to a local syndicate is the only play he has left. The truth about the rookie coach's performance is somewhere in the middle. The Bats are definitely going through some growing pains, but all is not lost. At least, that's how it appeared before the Bats took the field against the team that **Charles Wood** of the *Charles wood Banner and Charles wood Sun* calls, "the pathetic Pats."

Billtown came into this game as six-point favourites. Notwithstanding their bad loss to Georgia the week before, this was considered a light line; a possible overreaction to a simple "bad day" against the Gladiators. After all, the Pats were still even money in Vegas to go win-less on the season – that is how bad they looked with rookie **Kenny Pickett** learning on the job. This year's 'Community Coach' of the Patriots, **Samson "Sam" Simpson**, an athletics program director at Booth University College in Winnipeg, had approached this challenge by setting what he called "achievable goals" for each game, that fell short of actually asking the team to win. For this game, the simple goals of the Patriots were: "to play 60 minutes of football and cut down on turnovers," he told *CKY-DT* (Channel 7) in Winnipeg before the game. Coming off a second half collapse and four turnovers against York the week before, these seemed like reasonable goals, but achieving them would not be so easy against one of the top-ranked defences in the league.

Bats coach, **Stephen Michael**, exuded confidence in his pre-game address to the media. "This is an opportunity for us to reset," he declared. "This week, I held focus groups among the players to reboot and refocus the team. We now have a clear vision for success and we are all onboard with it. Somebody told me the Patriots are not very good, which surprised me, because didn't they go to the playoffs last year? I guess things change quickly in this league. Anyway, we plan to use them to get back on track this week."

The "Patriots are not very good" comment of course spread like wildfire through both social and mainstream media. Obviously, it is true, but nobody actually *says* that about an opponent in the professional realm. The Pats may be looking at the top pick in the draft when this season is over, but they are still professionals. They reminded everyone about that in the shocker that followed.

The game started well for Billtown. They came out firing on all cylinders, deploying four-wide sets, with *Justin Herbert* slinging the pigskin with the accuracy of a sniper: A long cross to *Cole Beasley* for 28 yards; a mid-range cross to *Mecole Hardman* for

20 yards; a slant to *Jerry Jeudy* for 18 yards; and a perfectly-executed screen pass to *James Conner* for a 9-yard touchdown! It took four plays and 2:21 off the clock to move 75 yards and get on the board first. It looked like it would be a long day for the Pats.

"That's what I'm talking about!" yelled coach **Stephen Michael** as he pumped his fist in the air and bounced along the sideline as his offence came off the field. The Bats had been running a lot of three and four-wide receiver sets out of the pistol, with mixed success through four weeks. They had been built to run the ball by their former coach, but Michael's stated "vision" was of "a team with no limits. A team with infinite possibilities. A team able to impose its will." He had been determined to open up the passing game and had finally succeeded beyond expectations on the game's opening drive. He stood beaming on the sideline as his team prepared to kick off.

The Pats responded with nothing like the efficiency of their opponent, but were able to move the chains. *Kenny Pickett* hit *Travis Kelce* underneath the coverage for a 13-yard gain on 3rd & 11 to avoid a three-and-out. The Bats' secondary had been playing way off, allowing the veteran Kelce in settle in comfortably at the first down marker and fall forward for a few extra yards. It was a rare 3rd & long conversion and it brought a spark to the offence. *David Bell* got loose on a pass to the outside and sprinted down the sideline for a 36-yard gain. Pickett followed that up with completions of 17 yards to *Odell Beckham* and 13 yards to Kelce. A 5-yard check down to *Devin Singletary* to convert 3rd & 2 brought first down at the Bats' 11-yard line. From there it took one throw from Pickett to Bell inside the goal line to get on the board. The extra point was blocked by *Jason Pierre-Paul*, but that did not dampen the good feeling on the Pats' sideline. They had responded immediately and effectively to the opening blow from the Bats.

"For f*\$k sake! What the f#@k was that?" bellowed coach Michael as his defence strolled off the field. "You call that defence? I thought you guys were supposed to be good! I can't do everything. Geez! You let a rookie slice and dice you. Remember what we talked about! What should you all be saying before every play? 'Thou shalt not pass!' That's what Gandalf told the Balrog. Now come on! Let's play Bats football!"

Perhaps it was the simple fact of the Pats' startling march back up the field for the score. Perhaps it was something more than that – something in the way the Patriots were moving, or something in their expression. Perhaps it was something in the Bats themselves. Whatever it was, it seemed to take hold of the Billtown offence and they never regained the swagger and confidence of that opening drive. They went three-and-out on their next possession and the game settled into hard labour for both sides.

A 29-yard pass to *Jakobi Meyers* and passes of 21 yards to Beckham and 13 yards to Kelce vaulted the Pats into the red zone on their next series. On 3rd & 3 at the Billtown 4, *Vita Vea* sacked Pickett to keep the Pats out of the end zone. *Nick Folk* then banged it in from 28 yards to give Charleswood a short-lived 9-7 lead. The Bats replied with a 46-yard *Ka'imi Fairbairn* field goal to regain the lead, 10-9, then added another from 52 yards to secure a 13-9 advantage before half time.

The situation had stabilized for the Bats after the Folk field goal. Their defence was gaining control of the line of scrimmage and the offence was getting points, even if they had been reduced to moving in fits and starts and lacked finish. The offence did look out of sorts. For example, prior to the second of Fairbairn's field goals, the Bats had faced 3rd & 7 at the Pats' 30. Herbert took the snap out of the shotgun, secured the ball with two hands, and plunged forward for a 1-yard gain. It looked in every way like a sneak, but without the concentrated power behind it. It was a strange call, and Herbert did appear to be baffled as he returned to the sideline. Coach Michael rolled his eyes and shook his head. "Execution!" he barked at Herbert.

The teams grunted out a scoreless third, with the Pats failing to gain a first down and the Bats all but abandoning the aggressive passing game after an 11-yard sack of Herbert by *Sheldon Richardson*. Maintaining their spread formations, the Bats started to run the ball, making incremental gains, but moving the chains all the same as the third quarter ticked away. Play resumed in the 4th with Herbert missing *Sammy Watkins* on 3rd & 6, to bring on Fairbairn for this third field goal of the game, this one from 42 yards, to give Billtown what felt, under the circumstances, to be a somewhat comfortable 16-9 lead. While the offence clearly had lost whatever edge it had once had, the defence had been in control since late in the 1st quarter. As the Charleswood offence set up at its own 20-yard line after a holding call on the kickoff return, the Bats' defenders and many Bats fans envisioned a panicked rookie quarterback, trying to do too much, getting picked off for a score going the other way, or fumbling away the ball on a sack. This was the point in a game when great defences feasted on so-so-offences. What happened next, stunned them all.

Pickett took the snap out of the shotgun as *Demario Davis* came charging on the blitz. Singletary picked him up, but the rush flushed Pickett from the pocket. He moved to his right and with a quick flick of the wrist spun the ball to a hole in the zone, where it was snared by a curling Meyers. With no defender in his close vicinity, he turned up field, side-stepped a tackle and galloped all the way to the Billtown 33-yard line, where he was brought down by *Jordan Fuller* for a 47-yard gain. Half-empty Patriot Place exploded in glee, the sound of 30,000 fans reverberating in the dome, giving the illusion of many more. Their Pats were not going down without a fight.

Like many big plays at unexpected moments, the effect lingered long after the play itself. The Pats' offence, overly excited at its achievement, false-started on the next two snaps. The miscues brought up 1st & 20, but when it came time for the Bats' defence to be tested, they staggered. Pickett found Kelce for 10 yards, Bell for 15 yards and a first down, Singletary for 6 and Kelce for 8 to bring up 1st & goal at the Billtown 4. Three plays later Singletary swept into the end zone from 2 yards out, bringing the crowd to its feet and Coach Michael's *Microsoft Surface* tablet to the ground as he hurled it in disgust.

"Where's the defence?? Where's the f^%king defence?" Michael bawled.

This time the extra point was good. With 10:39 left to play, the Pats had tied the game at 16. There was still plenty of time for the Bats to run away with the game, judging from how York had rag-dolled this same Pats' defence late in the game last week, but to do so they would have to recapture that spirit of no-fear that had animated them on the opening drive. Where it had gone was a mystery.

The Bats came out in their four-wide set and took to the air, but the Pats' defence was ready for it and defensive line pinned their ears back. The Billtown line struggled against the rush, giving Herbert little time and space to find his receivers. On 3rd & 3, Herbert threw to an empty part of the field on a timing pattern where he threw out and his receiver turned in.

Coach Michael grabbed the Microsoft Surface of a nearby assistant and threw it on the ground. "I called for a complete pass on that play!" he screeched. "I did not call for a f!^k up!" For a split second he thought about going for it on 4th down then thought better of it when he saw that the line of scrimmage was already in field goal range. In disgust he sent on the punting unit.

The Bats' coach was clearly accustomed to things going his way in business and in life. A very charming man off the field, in interviews, in meetings, and reportedly on the cocktail circuit, he had been reduced to an abusive, irrational, tightly-spun ball of nerves by the unimaginable situation he found himself and his team in against what many pundits believed was the hands-down worst team in the league. He may have thought of his friend, Archer, in these moments of on-field setbacks. What had been the other side of that bet? If Archer had agreed to mow the gigantic lawn of his estate with an antique mechanical lawn mower, what had **Stephen Michael** agreed to give him if he did, indeed, fail to make the playoffs?

The Patriots were living high in the moment. For a brief time, they forgot they were supposed to be bad. They were, after all, professional football players and each one had been the best player on the field at some point in their lives. These memories helped guide them over the next 9 minutes and 33 seconds.

The Pats took over at their own 21, facing a rabid and angry Bats' defence. Like their coach, this proud and ostensibly elite group of defenders were well-aware of what the football world would think if they failed to stop the rag-tag Charleswood offence, led by a wet-behind-ears rookie. They came after him and came hard, but Pickett was playing with inspiration, not conscious thought. He side-stepped the rush, scrambling on back-to-back plays for a total of 6 yards, before coolly finding Singletary underneath for a 6-yard gain on 3rd & 4. He then handed off to Singletary on consecutive plays in an attempt to defuse the pass rush. The running back gained 9 yards on those two carries then moved the chains on 3rd & 1 by leaking to an empty space and snaring an outlet pass for 4 yards.

After failing to get off the field on two consecutive third downs, the Billtown defence had had enough. Davis came on a delayed blitz and his sudden appearance panicked the rookie. He threw early and off target behind the receiver a split-second before Davis slammed into him and brought him down hard to the ground. The late hit brought two yellow flags from two different officials. Pickett picked himself off the turf with the help of center *Lloyd Cushenberry* as the referee announced the foul to a roaring home town crowd.

The penalty brought the Pats to the Billtown 39, just beyond the cusp of Folk's field goal range. If the Pats failed to move another inch, it would set up a 57-yard attempt. Folk's career long was 55 yards, last made 8 years ago when his leg was a stronger. The Pats would need more than a couple of yards. They got it on the next three plays, with Singletary pushing forward 6 yards on 2 carries and Kelce circling back for a 6-yard check down. The Bats got their stop finally, when *Shaquill Griffin* tipped a pass intended to Beckham, bringing up 4th & 8 at the 27. Folk came on for a makeable, but nowhere near guaranteed, 45-yard attempt. The snap was true, the hold was clean and the kick went sailing through the uprights to give the Pats a 19-16 lead with 3:12 left on the clock.

As the network broke for a commercial and the special teams units took to the field, there was a commotion on the Billtown sideline. The Bats' coach was trying to talk but could not get the words out. His face was flushed and his eyes bugged out. He looked like he might be having a heart attack, but his swinging arms, knocking away anyone who got close enough to check on him, suggested it was something else – a kind of fit of apoplexy that had rendered him speechless. Finally, it came out, loud enough for the fans to hear:

"I CAN'T F*\$KING BELIEVE THIS IS HAPPENING!" He shrieked at the top of his lungs.

Ashton Dulin attempted to return the ensuing kick from two yards deep and was tackled at the 21. Herbert took over with the game on the line. He grimly surveyed the defence. The Pats were just as tense. Montez Sweat jumped into the neutral zone on the hard count for a 5-yard encroachment penalty. On 1st & 5, Dalvin Cook, who had played second fiddle to the passing game on this day, swept to the left for 8 yards for an easy first down. The Bats were in no hurry just yet and were content to run plays at a normal pace up to the two-minute warning and beyond, with a pair of 10-yard passes to Beasley and a 10-yard bootleg by Herbert racking up three first downs and bringing the ball to the Patriots' 30-yard line, well within Fairbairn's range, with 49 seconds left.

With a field goal all but secured, it was time to see if they could put the game away. Herbert jogged to the line to conserve time, barked a couple of quick signals and dropped back to pass. In his hurry he neglected to set his feet and his throw sailed high. Pats' corner *Ronald Darby*, reading Herbert's eyes the whole way, got a bead on it from the start. He timed his leap perfectly, launched himself in the air, and picked off the pass!

Patriot Place went nuts. And so did the Bats' coach. With no new tablet within reach, he stomped on his old one. He then tore of his headset, knocked over a cooler of Gatorade, kicked the bench...and immediately regretted it. He spent the rest of the game in intense pain on that bench holding his right foot as the team doctor tended to him. An unnamed assistant took over coaching duties.

The Bats had all three of their timeouts remaining. Theoretically, they could get the ball back. There was a remote possibility they could block the punt or even get a big return. And, of course, there was always the outside chance of the Patriots doing something really, really boneheaded – they had a 'Community Coach,' after all. But these were all faint hopes. The game was all but lost; or at least deserved to be, from the Billtown standpoint.

Darby had returned the interception to the Pats' 35. That was where the offence took control. Their 'Community Coach,' following the advice of his professional paid assistant, responsibly handed the ball off to the sure-handed *Alvin Kamara* three straight times. Kamara dutifully ran behind his blocks and did not try to stretch the play when he was in the defender's grasp. The result was a

net of 2 yards on 3 carries and another appearance by punter, *Riley Dixon*. He booted it high and to the 14-yard line, where the speedy Hardman hauled it in and took off through a big hole in the coverage. For a moment the crowd held its breath. The Bats' return man was known for his blazing speed. He picked up a full head of steam across the 20-yard line. Playing like a man possessed, however, Darby came jetting across the field at an angle and lassoed Hardman's legs to bring him down at the Bats' 31, with 0:30 left on the clock.

The Bats had to cover 34 yards in 30 seconds, with no timeouts, to get into the edge of Fairbairn's known range. His career long was 53 yards, which he had made in 2019 with the Knights. It was not an impossible task, but nothing that had been witnessed since the game's opening drive hinted that the Bats were up to the task against a confident Pats' defence playing hard to the whistle.

Herbert took the snap, stepped to the right, and was sacked by the mountainous rookie *Jordan Davis*, who bulled through the middle of the Bats' line and swallowed the quarterback before he could get his feet set. With no timeouts, the Bats scrambled to line up. As the clock hit unlucky 0:13, Herbert set up deep in the pocket, looked downfield and was blindside by Sweat for a 13-yard loss. The fans at Patriot Place jumped to their feet. The Bats would not be able to get a play off. It was over – the Pats had beaten the Bats, a result that nobody saw coming.

After the game, Patriots' owner **Jason Findlay** was gracious in victory, while taking a bit of a jab at those in the national media who had predicted his team would not win a game all year: "I am proud of this team, not because they won a game, but because they played their hearts out against a very good team that was also playing their hearts out. One can never predict what will happen on the football field. I think all of us who think we know what players can do should remember that."

Billtown owner and coach, **Stephen Michael** hobbled up to the podium, a cast on his right foot, looking far more composed than he had looked on the sideline during the game. He smiled a beguiling smile and slid smoothly into the biggest pile of bullshitting you are likely to hear at an EFL post-game presser: "This loss today was the best thing that could have happened to us, and to America," he began. "The Patriots gave us an example of what you can achieve when you believe in yourself. They gave us an example of how to overcome adversity. They won more than a game today – they won the hearts of a nation that knows what its like to have to fight for survival. To fight for freedom. To fight for the American Way. God Bless America! God bless the Billtown Bats! Now, go home and hug your children. Tell them you love them. Tell them to cheer for the Bats, because now, with America, we're going all the way!"

It was a virtuoso performance from a man who knows how to work a room. It was complete crap, but it successfully diverted attention away from his team's shoddy performance on the field and his own embarrassing discomposure on the sideline. Now everyone is talking about how the coach of the Billtown Bats is happy to have lost to arguably the worst team in the league, for the sake of America! The coach may have bought him and his team some time with that deflection. However, at 2-3, the Bats are heading in the wrong direction and look to be stuck with their neophyte coach, for bat-ter, or worse!

AROUND THE EFL

The new Bats coach was not the only one to melt down in Week Five. A confounding decision by *You-Know-Who* turned what might have been a second big celebratory upset into a mob of unhappy fans. Let's go to the Fish Tank...

Memories of 2021 came back to life in Week Five for Swordfish fans, at least temporarily. Kirk Cousins threw for 307 yards and 3 TDs, and his offence converted perfectly on 4th down to keep the Fish in the game against the Durham powerhouse until the final two minutes. The Lizards had just taken a 34-30 lead with 1:50 remaining on Josh Allen's third touchdown run of the game (each for 8 yards!). For some inane reason, Coach Russ decided to insert Gardner Minshew into the game at QB to lead the prospective gamewinning drive. The result: A 27-yard pick-six for Tyrann Mathieu on Minshew's second official pass attempt. Now down 41-30 with hardly a hope in hell, Minshew was sent back in again, only to immediately throw another pick, which iced the game for Durham. After the game, Coach Lemmon was besieged by the press. He explained his decision with a guilty mumble: "I thought Minshew would provide a spark." It was a baffling statement to accompany a baffling call. His team had been sparking like a downed power line under Cousins. If the Swordfish defence could actually stop anybody, this would have been a different outcome. It was not as if Cousins had turned cold after a hot start. On Sebastian's previous possession, he had thrown passes of 48 and 10 yards to Amari Cooper, the latter for a TD to put the Fish in front 30-27. Cousins had not played better all season - his performance coming against one of the league's top defences on top of it. This decision to pull his hot QB may have been a bridge too far for the eccentric Lemmon. Cousins was visibly angry on the sideline, throwing his helmet while being restrained from approaching his coach by back-up tight end John Bates. The offence that took the field with Minshew looked deflated. It wasn't fair to Minshew either. Of course, there are plenty of Lemmon cultists on Florida's Treasure Coast who will defend whatever daft idea gets expressed by their hero on and off the football field. On cue, Horatio Spoonwad of the 'Lemmon for President Club,' a free association of patriotic citizens dedicated to assisting the Swordfish coach make a presidential run whenever he is ready, came out with a public statement on behalf of the club, stating: "It was because Kirk was hot up until that point that it was the perfect time to remove him from the game. Why wait until he throws his first bad pass to second guess yourself? Russ was not going to do that to Kirk, his team, or his fans. The only way to avoid that was to put in Gardner and hope that the unexpected would create some Minshew Magic." There is no arguing with that, because anyone who could think that way cannot be reasoned with. God help America if Russ ever became President.

In his first start after taking a back seat to *Davis Mills* in Week Four, the Corn Kings' *Jimmy Garoppolo* sent a message to his team and to his fans about who "the man" really is in Cowtown. Okay, we all know "*The Man*" is *TJ Watt*, but the *second* man, "the man," is Jimmy G. Against Scarborough at The Eagle's Nest, he showed why, completing 18 of 25 for 217 yards and 2 TDs. He even converted four first downs with his legs, rushing for 26 yards. He was helped along by a stout running attack led by *Jamaal Williams* and

Devontae Booker, who combined for 163 of the Corn Kings' 200 rushing yards, but when Jimmy G needed to be on his game against a persistent Scarborough blitz, he was. This was supposed to be the "get right" game for Scarborough, and it quickly turned into a disaster after **Isaiah McKenzie**'s 26-yard punt-return set up Cowtown in excellent field position. A short out pass to **Allen Lazard** turned into a 25-yard scoring play after corner **Michael Davis** tried to jump the route but missed. That gave Lazard free reign down the sideline for the opening score. It was all downhill from there for Scarborough. The Corn Kings gave them no chance, controlling the ball for 42 mins.

At Camelot, the Excaliburs survived three interceptions by *Tom Brady* to overcome the Irish, 24-19. That was because *Carson Wentz* was even less productive, throwing for just 140 yards and converting just 1 of 9 third down attempts. Had it not been for the Brady miscues setting them up, the Irish might never have found the end zone. Linebacker, *Cole Holcomb* picked off his third pass of the season to continue to shine for the York defence. Wentz does not look like the answer in East Elmhurst.

At the Iowa City Superplex in Iowa City, the Triumph ran right through the Cubs, piling up 279 yards rushing and racking up 28 first downs on the way to a 31-13 victory. Rookie, *Breece Hall* stood out, with 148 yards on 19 carries and 3 TDs, the third coming on a 45-yard run on the first series of the second half to put Twin Cities in the driver's seat. *Darrel Henderson Jr* also rushed for an even 100 yards on 18 carries. That the Cubs have one the worst defences in the league is not a surprise. However, its highly permeable properties were not as obvious in the first four weeks due to a knack for creating turnovers, that ranked second only to the Triumph heading into this game. Surprisingly, neither team turned the ball over in this contest, exposing the marked inferiority of the Cubs' back end when put up against a team capable of running the ball. Coach **Guy Williams** is being very careful with *Trevor Lawrence*. His quarterback protégé attempted just 20 passes in 64 official plays from scrimmage. Against a defence as pitiful as that of the Cubs, this conservative game plan can work. Against a better team, it will struggle if Lawrence can't execute the full playbook.

At New Era Field in Buffalo, the Bombers came from behind to knock off the Derailers, 23-21. After falling behind 14-6, **Kenny Main** turned to *Elijah Mitchell* and *Leonard Fournette* to stabilize the offence. Mitchell rushed for 121 yards and a TD on 17 carries, while Fournette battled for the tough yards, with 45 on 16 carries to set up the comeback. *Jared Goff* completed only 12 passes, but one was a TD to *Chris Godwin* that turned out to be the difference. That the Derailers' offence had a respectable outing against an underrated Bruxelles defence is no consolation for suffering fans in Buffalo forced to watch another loss at home. Buffalo played well for three of four quarters, but an offensive drought in the third, that included an interception of *Lamar Jackson* by *Darius Slay*, turned the momentum over to the Bombers and eventually cost them the game.

At *TERRORDOME* in Virden, *Ezekiel Elliott* did just enough to neutralize the effect of 3 *Patrick Mahomes* interceptions as the Violators ran past the Convicts, 21-15. When Virden got close, they turned to Elliott, who ran it in for TDs from 2 and 3 yards out. It is not often that a quarterback throws 3 interceptions and still wins the game, although it happened with Brady in York as well. Fortunately for Virden, their defence played well against *Dak Prescott*, picking him off once and limiting his options downfield.

At Ferenc-Liszt International Airport Stadium in Budapest, *Aaron Rodgers* threw for 421 yards and 3 TDs to lift the North Stars over the Gladiators, 33-24. While statistically, this was a mis-match, Georgia somehow managed to hang in, trailing just 26-24 after three quarters. Rodgers then connected with *Nelson Agholor* for a 46-yard TD, their third scoring hook-up of the day, to give Budapest the breathing room they needed. The refs certainly did their part to move the game along – not a single penalty was called on Georgia and only two on Budapest. *Justin Jefferson* continued to make plays in double-coverage, with a 61-yard catch-and-run that set up a FG.

At Kelly-Burke Field in Erieau, a sellout crowd watched the revved-up Cadillac drive by the slumping Hawks, 38-28. *Trevon Diggs* had a pick-six, rookie *Dameon Pierce* scored two TDs, on an 11-yard run and on an 11-yard pass, and *Kyler Murray* added 3 TD passes to bring his season total to 8. For Brooklin it was a tale of two halves. They led 21-17 at half time, but were shell-shocked into submission by a 21-point Erieau third quarter. The Caddies have now won four in a row after losing the season opener to East Elmhurst.

Four turnovers by the Coyotes sealed their fate, as New Jersey strolled to a 27-0 win at Stone Pony Shore. This game was decided in the 2nd quarter when the Wrecking Balls exploded for 20 points after sputtering offensively for the first 20 minutes. With that done, *David Montgomery* was given the task of getting both teams off the field as soon as possible. He rushed for 163 yards and a TD on 28 carries to earn player-of-the-game honours. *Ryan Tannehill* was intercepted three times and *JaMycal Hasty* fumbled into the arms of *Matt Milano*, who ran it back for a TD. A 27-point win is nothing to sneeze at, but one gets the feeling that the Wrecking Balls are doing just enough to get by and nothing more. They remain unbeaten after facing teams with a combined winning percentage of .160. We won't know just how tough this team actually is until they meet Billtown in Week Ten. Then again, the way the Bats are playing, that game might not be the test we thought it would be.

At Kingdome in Seattle, the "young" leg of *Younghoe Koo* and the stout Peg City defence lifted the Crusaders over the Pilots, 22-6. Koo went a perfect five-for-five from the field, with his longest coming from 47 yards to give his team a 9-6 lead at half time. *Drew Lock* got the start at QB this week for Seattle but was relieved by *Sam Darnold*, who might have preferred to sit on the bench against the top-ranked Crusader 'D.' Darnold was sacrificed by his coach on 4th & 10 at the Peg City 43-yard line on Seattle's opening drive of the second half. *Chris Jones* went full bore and sacked him for a 7-yard loss. He was picked off later by *Bobby Okereke*, which set up the game's only TD – a 4-yard run by *Saquon Barkley*. It was the first rushing touchdown of the season for the Crusaders.

And finally, the boobirds were loud at the GM Megadome on Sunday, as the Pink Panthers dropped their 15th straight game, 38-17 to Pickering. Oshawa has not won since prevailing 21-19 over Twin Cities in Week Seven of 2021. Although the score was lop-sided, this was not a stellar performance by the Spartans' offence. Four Oshawa turnovers, three of those interceptions by *Matt Ryan*, tilted the field in favour of the run-dominant Spartans' attack. With Ryan now playing like *Jameis Winston*, what are the Panthers to do?

IOWA CITY @ NEW JERSEY (line – WRECKING BALLS by 6)

The turnover tree bore no fruit last week for the Cubbies. The result was total exposure of its defence for the fraud that it is, as the Triumph ran all over them for over 275 yards on the ground in a loss. Russell Wilson was unable to keep up despite concerted efforts to stretch the field with bombs and long passes. This week the Cubs face a better Wrecking Balls defence coming off a shutout. Yes, it came against Cobb County, but keeping any team off the board is an achievement in this era. New Jersey is unbeaten, but one has the feeling they haven't really started anything yet. They were slow to start last week and never really hit a high gear offensively, relying on four turnovers to pave the way to an easy victory. They will have to pick up the pace here against a Cubs team that ranks second in points scored and is unaware of its own badness. It should not be hard for NJ to score more than 30 points. **PICK: NEW JERSEY**

Both teams started the season with back-to-back wins then followed up with back-to-back losses. The divergence occurred last week when the Bombers climbed over the Derailers, powered by the league's most prolific run game and the Convicts fell to Virden, in part, because they could not establish the run as a viable threat. The Convicts miss Christian McCaffrey. Justin Jackson and Ronald Jones will not make up the loss, so it has to be Dak Time or bust for the foreseeable future. The chance to run away with the West is slipping away from the Convicts and they feel it, so this is a "must win" in the psychological, not literal sense. The Bombers are still relevant, even if few predicted they would be. The Bombers have to manage their quarterback and rely on an improved, but imperfect defence to stay close. Expect them to stick close to the Convicts until the end, before falling to Dak in the final minute. **PICK: CHINO**

I was surprised to see that the Nerds in Nevada gave the Derailers +3 points at home and relieved to see the public push that down the slightest of underdog lines. Still, the fact that Buffalo is a more talented team across the board, a pre-season favourite to be in contention with New Jersey in the East, yet is an underdog in its home park against the one-win Pilots, forces one to pause. The 'Drew Lock Effect' was dispelled last week against Peg City while Sam Darnold borders on unusable. So, who is going to play quarterback for Seattle? Certainly, nobody on the roster, including Trey Lance, is in the same league as Lamar, even a Lamar used and abused by his clueless coach. Buffalo has been a game-day disappointment almost every week to this point while the Pilots have tended to surprise. That is the lure to catch pro-Seattle fish. Don't be fooled, this is Buffalo's chance to get back on track. **PICK: BUFFALO**

COBB COUNTY @ BILLTOWN (line - BATS by 5)

Both teams are coming off, arguably, their low-points of the still very young season. The Bats losing to Charleswood calls into question every pre-conceived notion held by the vast majority of the Football World relating to the capabilities of this team. The star-studded defence has not lived up to expectations. Last week they were pecked to death in the final quarter by the rubber-tipped beak of

Kenny Pickett, giving up a 7-point lead in the 4th quarter against one of the league's worst offences. Worse, their young phenom at quarterback was picked off in a critical moment as they pressed to tie or win the game. The Coyotes were shutout last week and lost by 27 points. Reality is arriving for the undermanned Coyotes, but they can still be a pain in the a**. **PICK: COBB COUNTY**

VIRDEN @ TWIN CITIES (line – TRIUMPH by 4)

My stomach is still sore from laughing from when I saw this line from my Brethren in the Barren Lands. Take Virden – don't dwell too long on it. Having delivered the bottom-line up front, I will now offer the caveats, the thoughts that may be prompting professionals to think that the Triumph should be favoured by more than a field goal. The Triumph defence leads the league in red zone defence, not to mention run defence and, critically, points allowed. This is the result of good coaching, rather than loads of talent. On the other side, the Violators lead the league in passing yards per game and rushing average, yet are 9th in points scored. They rank no.15 in red zone scoring. On defence, they are not adept at stopping either the pass or the run. In other words, the Violators are not efficient at translating their strengths into results, while the Triumph are. Still, Patrick Mahomes vs Trevor Lawrence offers just one result. **PICK: VIRDEN**

How things have changed since last year! The Pats are now rebuilding while the Crusaders are simply building. The Pats notched their first win last week against one of the powers in the west. While impressive on the surface, analysts viewed the win as a product of Bats ineptitude more than Pats power. On the other hand, the Crusaders' submersion of Seattle – the same team that had beaten the Irish on the road – speaks loudly about which of these teams has the true winning trajectory behind it. There is no doubt in my mind that the Crusaders are ascendent and the Pats are just happy to play loose and pick-off opponents in a funk, or those that take them too lightly. As long as they don't win too many games, the Pats' future is fun. I like the Pegs to win here, but their safe, plunky offence moves at a glacial pace, one that may not have enough time to stretch the point differential into double-digits. **PICK: CHARLESWOOD**

It was a rare kind of win for the Cadillac last week. They outgained an offensive-minded team and added a pick-six to outlast the Hawks and take control of the South Division. For the Thunder Lizards, they had to dodge the football stylings of the league's most unpredictable team, Sebastian, to arrive at the most predictable result, another Durham win. The Lizards are undoubtedly the league's most powerful team after five weeks, but the long season is not always a reflection of the early season trajectory. There will be lulls in any power push. This game has the potential to put a brake on the runaway Lizard train. The Caddies have a true ballhawk in Trevon Diggs, who will let Cooper Kupp get his catches with the goal of setting up a pick or two. Antonio Gibson will struggle to maintain his league-leading 6.2 yards-per-carry average against a stingy Erieau run defence. A switched-on Kyler Murray brings a third dimension to the offence that will challenge the Durham line. All this translates into a much closer game than many think. **PICK: ERIEAU**

We got a taste of the Swordfish offence of 2021 last week. Kirk Cousins finally broke out with a 300-yard/3 TD pass game. Sadly, it was not enough to overtake Durham and Josh Allen, who barreled through the undermanned Sebastian line for 3 TD runs. The neglected Swordfish defence is holding its own against long odds, but as the season wears on it will break down. We could see the first signs of that break down here. Yes, the win-less Pink Panthers have done nothing well so far. Their freefall continued with a feeble effort against Pickering last week. Yes, it's been ugly, but they are not as bad as they look. They will remind us of that this week. **PICK: OSHAWA**

SCARBOROUGH @ GEORGIA (line – GLADIATORS by 11)

The Blue Eagles are a team in a deep funk. They thought they would get right against Cowtown last week, only to be handed their lunch. The problems start with quarterback, Joe Burrow, who has not looked comfortable, but they certainly don't end with him. Receivers aren't getting open, D'Ernest Johnson is not a full-time running back, and Orlando Brown Jr is struggling in pass protection. The defence

is giving up 33 points per game and the secondary is getting torched every week. The Gladiators are coming off a proud, if losing effort against Budapest. The Tua Era is proceeding more or less according to plan as the young quarterback develops on the job. This game has the potential to bring him a boost of confidence. More likely, it will be a tougher test than he thought. **PICK: SCARBOROUGH**

COWTOWN @ EAST ELMHURST (line – IRISH by 3)

The Corn Kings corrected a two-game slide by roughing up the Blue Eagles last week – nothing to crow loudly about, but at least no repeat of the no-show versus the Coyotes. It is hard to gauge what this team is capable of. Hints of playoff pedigree blended seamlessly with spots of comic bumbliness. The Irish met a top-rate defence last week against York and discovered, to their consternation, that their quarterback was not up to the challenge and there is only so much Tyreek Hill and Aaron Jones can do to help him. The defence, however, is for real, even if it is statistically unapparent in categories like yards surrendered. The Irish defence is no.1 in getting off the field on 3rd down, which means opposing punters have to be on their game. Cowtown has a good one. **PICK: EAST ELMHURST**

BUDAPEST @ YORK (line – NORTH STARS by 3)

The North Stars continue to win, although not with the same self-assuredness of the early dynasty version. They controlled the game against the Glads last week yet still found themselves leading by only 2 points heading into the final quarter. This week they face a familiar divisional foe in York, one still looking for that defining moment that will vault them into the ranks of the elite. This game is an opportunity to establish themselves as a true contender and gain back a game in the race for the Coastal Division. To be successful they will need a more reliable ground game than they have had so far. Tom Brady attempting 35 passes a game is not the desirable Excalibur formula for success, even with his shiny new targets. They will, of course need a turnover or two as well – something tough to come by against Aaron Rodgers. In any case, I expect this game to be a bit of a brawl and an ugly experience for both teams. **PICK: YORK**

While York has its hands full this week, the Spartans look to continue adding to the 'W' column with a home date against the struggling Hawks. Brooklin turned the ball over three times last week and Derek Carr ran out of gas in the second half against Erieau. Since a 135-yard effort by Austin Ekeler in Week One, the run game has been a non-factor in the offence. Meanwhile, the defence is surrendering four football fields of real estate per game. Expect the Pickering run game to plough through them like a Deere. **PICK: PICKERING**





FROM THE EFL ARCHIVES – In Week Five of the 2016 EFL season, the upstart St. Charles Chargers scored what was viewed as a major upset over the heavily-favoured Brooklin Hawks, beating them 20-13 at Optimist Park. *Carson Wentz* earned Game MVP by tossing 3 TD passes and making better use of his team's red zone opportunities than his counterpart, *Alex Smith*, who did not throw a TD pass but ran it in from 8 yards for his team's only TD. Prior to this loss, the high-flying Hawks had scored 35 points or more in each of their previous four games.

Rumours that the Markham North Stars had been

looking for a new home across the ocean were given credence when the personal aide to the Hungarian Prime Minister and the Assistant Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs and Trade were spotted enjoying the North Stars' 40-7 beatdown of the Wolverines as guests of **Darrin Jones** in a luxury box at the Dawg Pound. Stout denials of such a potential deal from both Jones and the EFL Head Office followed.

Kelvin Sheppard, linebacker for the Regulators, earned Defensive Player of the Week for his 61-yard fumble return TD with 2 minutes left that vaulted South Carolina over York, 14-10. It was the Regs' miraculous third straight win, while it halted York's two-game win streak.

Todd Gurley of the Corn Kings garnered Offensive Player of the Week honours for his role in leading Cowtown over slumping Scarborough, 36-20. Gurley rushed for 142 yards and 3 TDs on 21 carries. It was Scarborough's third straight loss.

At Jurassic Park in Durham, the Swordfish claimed sole possession of the North Division with their fourth straight victory, 30-24 over Durham. Rookie QB, *Jameis Winston* started for an injured *Andy Dalton* and was expected to struggle against the top-notch Durham secondary. Instead, young Jameis threw 3 TDs to lead his team to the win.
