

Stimulatory: The Undertakers cracked the red zone on their first two possessions but could not crack the Carthage end zone and had to sett le for a pair of Alex Henery field goals to take a 6-0 lead. The Cannibals made the most of their first red zone opportunity, finishing it with a 6-yard TD run by Eddie Lacy to take a 7-6 lead in the 2nd quarter. They quickly added to that lead when defensive end Michael Hardy stripped RGIII at the Death Valley 13 yard line and Philip Rivers checked down to Lacy on the next play for a 13-yard TD. The Undertakers added a field goal before half time then took a 15-14 lead on their first possession of the 3rd quarter when Michael Vick, subbing for a hurt RGIII, flipped the ball to back-up tight end Daniel Fells for a 1-yard TD pass. An interception by Undertakers' Matt Elam set off a series of 3 consecutive turnovers that kept both teams from capitalizing on scoring opportunities until late in the 4th quarter when Rivers capped off a 12-play, 76-yard drive with a 3rd down TD pass to Lance Moore to give Carthage a 20-15 lead. With 2:33 left, the Undertakers drove steadily up the field with Griffin at the helm, reaching the 17 yard line with 7 seconds left. Facing 7 DBs, Andre Johnson found the hole in the zone coverage and dragged a defender across the goal line for the winning TD.

The Cubs scored on their first two possessions, getting a 42-yard FG by *Greg Zuerlein* and a 1-yard TD pass to the corner of the end zone from *Colin Kaepernick* to *Dexter McCluster* for a 10-0 lead. The Monarchs replied with a drive into the Cubs' red zone but a pick by *Casey Hayward* took away a scoring chance. The teams ground it out without a scoring opportunity until the 4th when the Monarchs lined up for a 40-yard FG attempt. *Jason Pierre-Paul* blocked the kick and the Cubs marched back for a FG. A late TD pass to *Tony Gonzalez* wrapped up a blue collar shutout win for the Cubs.



An interception and a 55-yard fumble recovery for a TD by corner *T.J. McDonald* helped the Knights make up for a lost fumble by *Shonn Greene*, and a 79-yard punt return for a TD by the Convicts' *Keshawn Martin*, to work their way into a 17-17 tie at half time. But in the 2nd half Chino took control starting with the opening kickoff return by *Trindon Holliday* that went 92 yards for a TD. The LA offence missed 3 straight 4th-down conversion attempts and the Convicts capitalized with a FG and 2 TD passes from *Cam Newton* to *Roddy White*, turning the game into a rout by the 4th quarter.




The Glads grabbed a 14-0 lead on a 24-yard TD pass from *Ben Roethlisberger* to *Reggie Wayne* and a 6-yard TD run by rookie *Joseph Randle* after *Arian Foster* lost a fumble inside the Garland red zone. Foster pounded it into the end zone on the Mustangs' next possession to cut the Gwinnett lead in half but the Glads added a pair of FGs to lead 20-10 at half time. The Mustangs drove inside the Gwinnet red zone early in the 3rd but an interception by *Dion Jordan* snuffed out the opportunity. Foster scored his 2nd TD of the game in the 4th, but a late *Shaun Suisham* FG put the game on ice.




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After Durham scored on their first possession, two 1st-quarter turnovers by **Drew Brees** led to a 10-7 lead for the Triumph. But consecutive TD drives in the 2nd guarter put the Lizards back in front 21-16 at half time. Durham opened the 2nd half with a 69-yard drive highlighted by *Calvin Johnson's* 3rd TD catch of the game. Twin Cities responded with a 16-play, 80-yard drive ending with *Dwayne Allen* hauling in a 5-yard TD pass from *Jay Cutler*. After a turnover and a punt for each team, TD catches by *Eric Decker* and Johnson helped Durham stay in front of a scrappy Triumph team.




Markham scored the only major of a dreary 1st half on a 2-yard TD pass from *Eli Manning* to *Margues Colston* for a 7-6 lead. In the 3rd, Manning and Colston hooked up again to make it 14-6, but the Spartans scraped back with *Tashard* Choice running 9 straight times for 93 yards and scoring on a 17-yard run. Joe McKnight got it back on the next play with a 103-yard kick return for a TD to make it 21-13 Markham. After a TD run by Armando Allen made it 28-13, the Spartans capitalized on 2 turnovers to pull within 2 points and set up a game-winning FG try for Josh Scobee. He missed.




The Corn Kings opened the scoring in the 1st quarter, on a 4-yard TD run by *Alfred Morris*, and were off to the races. Aaron Rodgers struggled to move the ball for Scarborough in the early going, allowing Cowtown to build up a 17-0 lead. Then Rodgers went down for the game with an injury and things got even worse for the Blue Eagles. Back-up QB Greg **McElroy** was unable to move the ball, crossing just once into Cowtown territory due to an **Adrian Wilson** interception. The Eagles managed just 92 yards of offence. Morris rushed for 3 TDs and Joe Flacco threw for another in a total rout.




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Frank Gore rushed for a 7-yard TD run to give the Regulators a 10-0 lead in the 2nd quarter. The Swordfish notched 2 FGs before the half, one thanks to an interception by **Ronde Barber** in Regulator territory. Gore continued running wild in the 2nd half, scoring a TD early in the 4th quarter to make it 17-6. Sebastian answered with a 3-yard TD run by **Robert** Turbin to make it 17-12. **Rob Bironas** kicked a 37-yard FG with 1:55 left, but Sebastian marched back and scored on a 16-yard TD pass to **Kenny Britt** with no time left. **Shareece Wright** knocked the ball loose to stop the 2-point convert.



An interception by Pats' corner *Jerraud Powers* on the 2nd play of the game was an indicator of the kind of day it would be for *Matt Stafford* and the Violators. Taking over in the Violators' red zone, *Peyton Manning* connected with *Michael Crabtree* from 12 yards out to open the scoring and Charleswood never looked back. Virden traded touchdowns for field goals in the 1st half falling behind 21-6. A pick-six by *Leonard Johnson* to start the 2nd half followed immediately by another pick by *Mark Barron* to set up a Manning TD gave the Pats a 35-3 lead and total control the rest of the way.



A *Michael Turner* fumble in York territory set up a 9-yard TD pass from *Andrew Luck* to *Hakeem Nicks* to tie the game 10-10. Luck and Nicks then connected for a 48-yard TD pass with 36 seconds left in the 1st half to give Mohave the half time lead, 17-10. Turner tied it on a 3-yard TD run in the 3rd but *Jimmy Graham* gave the lead back to Mohave with a 9-yard TD grab. *Donald Jones* hauled in a 52-yard pass from *Tom Brady* to tie it 24-24. A FG by *Matt Prater* made it 27-24 Hellfire before DE *Michael Johnson* stripped Luck and *Lawrence Timmons* returned it 45 yards for York's winning TD.



It was just one play but it gave the Regulators their first win of the 2013 season. It was an exciting moment for the team. A win was badly needed to keep them in the race. Looking past this game it was just as exciting to see that Shareece Wright was the player who stepped up in the big moment and made a big play.

Of course, the play I'm talking about came after regulation time had expired in the Regulators' game against Sebastian. The Swordfish had just scored a touchdown to close within 2 points. The South Carolina secondary had looked lost as Kenny Britt ran around them and caught a long pass from Andy Dalton in the end zone. It was a sad but familiar sight,

But in this secondary, at age 25, he is one of the vets. Plays like the one he made this week are what Hal Corson and his coaching staff want to see from Wright and other young senior players. Could it be finally starting to come together for the youngsters?

If the light finally does come on this year and next for this young group of defensive backs, the Regulators should have the best secondary in the league instead of the worst.

SHAKING IT UP

The man who suggested that **Deron Redding's** obsession with his team's uniform might make him inclined to wear a skirt in his leisure hours might be a little susceptible to the same cross-dressing impulses. Undertakers' coach **Chris Worthley**, looking to change his team's fortunes at home, (where they were 0-2 going into this week), changed his team's look slightly by having them wear their "shroud white" road pants, instead of black, with their traditional black home jerseys. The Undertakers have always taken the field at the Graveyard dressed fully in black, befitting of their gloomy and sinister reputation. It was a minor change, but still a sign that fashion image might play a larger role in Worthley's overall coaching approach than originally thought. When this was put to him, he reacted testily:

"It's not about fashion, boys, it's about shaking it up," Worthley said, pointing at the inquisitive reporter for emphasis. "The different pants were just a small part of it. We did other things this week to break up the home routine. We spent the week practicing in Nova Scotia and flew into Hell yesterday to simulate a road game. Certainly, it seemed like most of the Undertakers had been up all night before the game against Carthage. The Cannibals, solid underdogs coming in, nearly handed Death Valley their 3rd straight loss at home. Thanks to a 3rd down TD pass from *Philip Rivers* to *Lance Moore* late in the 4th quarter, the visitors held a 20-15 lead going into the final two-and-a-half minutes of the game, forcing an unanticipated test of the Undertakers' young quarterback.

Starting at their 20 yard line, and needing a touchdown to win, *RGIII* took up the challenge of moving the ball against a defence that had held him in check for most of the game. He faced it head on; there was no attempt to deceive – the Undertakers flooded the field with wide receivers and the Cannibals flooded it with defensive backs. Over the course of 15 consecutive passing plays, the Undertakers nickel-and-dimed their way up the field, completing short and medium passes. This type of approach stood in stark contrast to their "bombs-away" strategy of last year, but what stayed the same was the end result; *Andre Johnson* made the big play at the biggest moment to make the difference.

With just 7 seconds remaining in the game, and the ball at the Carthage 17, Griffin threw underneath to Johnson, who was streaking across the middle on a slant pattern. The Cannibals were in a zone, with defenders positioned all around Johnson but with nobody directly on him. Johnson caught the ball in stride and his momentum carried him and defender *Jacob Lacey* the final 8 yards into the end zone for the dramatic game-winning score. The Graveyard erupted with howling,

screeching, and moaning, adding a macabre discordance to the jubilant atmosphere on the field. (At the Graveyard, the sound of joy is hardly distinguishable from sorrow to the untrained ear).

The play competed on network highlight segments this week with shots of another Johnson, Calvin, catching his 4th TD pass of the day for the Thunder Lizards in their 42-30 victory over Twin Cities. Inevitably, the debate is now in full swing about which superhuman wide receiver is better: 'Megatron' or 'Optimus Prime?' CJ or AJ? Every Coke needs its Pepsi, so I see nothing wrong with the competition. Like **Drew Brees** versus **Matt Stafford** last year, **CJ** versus **AJ** may result in two new records being set by the end of the year.

ESCAPE FROM BLUFFS STADIUM

Chris Dickinson is a nice guy – too nice, in fact. He is one of those really nice guys who people come to despise – especially people from tough, blue collar cities like Scarborough.

Dickinson, a Scarborough native, knows all too well the wrath of his own people. He knows the history, going back over 150 years, when Scarborough was the Borough of Scar, a tavern town where the local Pastor carried a knife for his own protection and church ladies carried derringers in their purses. And that is why he took extraordinary measures this week to avoid the crowds after his Blue Eagles were pummelled 37-0 in their own park by the Cowtown Corn Kings.

Following the worst performance in franchise history, in which the Blue Eagles gained a pathetic 92 yards of offence and scored no points, the fans in Scarborough finally rioted. It had been coming for some time actually, and this week the lid blew off.

Flush with pride after landing arguably the best team in EFL history when the Dragons left Florida, and hoping for the best from a team so talent-laden that winning was inevitable and any losing merely a delay of the inevitable, the "Scarberians" had held themselves in check for two years. But the loss to Sebastian last week was so shocking that many fans, a critical mass of them, began to doubt that a Championship would happen any time soon; or at least as long as **Chris Dickinson** was in charge. The brutal loss to Cowtown just proved it.

Dickinson, convivial by nature, has never quite reacted the way most Scarberians would to his team's woes. He is one of the "party-er"

types of Scarberians, and doesn't like getting bummed out about things. He makes excuses for his players and his coaches, puts a positive spin on everything, and orders another round of beers. The "brawler" type of Scarberian can't relate to that attitude, (although he can relate to the beer) and it is the brawlers who dominate the football crowd.

By the end of the third quarter, after the fans had confirmed that back-up QB, *Greg McElroy* would not be leading a miracle comeback, an angry mob gathered at the back of Bluffs Stadium at the entrance to the corporate offices, calling for Dickinson's nose (in the old Borough of Scar, a person who transgressed or stuck his nose into other people's business, was punished by symbolically, or actually, removing his nose). Not wanting to find out if the crowd was asking symbolically, or literally, Dickinson prevailed on his faithful secretary, Mable, to disrobe and hand him her clothes and car keys. Once Police had cleared away most of the angry crowd, Dickinson stumbled, rather inartfully in high heels, out to Mable's car. A small group of protestors who had returned to the parking lot, watched suspiciously, filming with their phone cams. One got close enough to realize something was wrong, but it was too late to stop the Blue Eagles' owner from driving Mable's car away. It was in this noble manner that **Chris Dickinson** saved his nose.

TERRIBLE AT TERRODOME

The highly anticipated showdown between Virden and Charleswood at **TERRORPOME** quickly fizzled as **Matt Stafford** shot himself and his team in both feet with a 4-interception performance that handed the Pats an easy 38-12 victory. Stafford got off to bad start, holding the ball too long and getting dumped in the backfield by **Phil Taylor** on the first play from scrimmage. He didn't make that mistake on the second play, but instead released the ball too early and was picked off by Pats' corner **Jerraud Powers**, who returned it 27 yards to inside the Virden red zone. Two plays later, **Peyton Manning** found **Michael Crabtree**, cutting inside

all alone, for a 12-yard TD pass and a quick 7-0 lead. The Violators never fully recovered from that poor start.

The next seven Virden offensive plays were all hand-offs to *Jamaal Charles*. If coach **Lance Barrate** was trying to send a message to his quarterback, it wasn't well-received. Stafford went on to have the worst day of his pro career, completing just 19 of 34 passes for 201 yards, 1 TD, and 4 interceptions, for a 43.5 QB rating. He was also sacked 4 times. His back-to-back picks to start the 2nd half, one of them a pick-six, buried the Violators psychologically and on the scoreboard. Fans were heading to the exits before the end of the 3rd quarter.

While the Pats looked pretty impressive – Manning was efficient and Crabtree took another step toward establishing himself as a leader on the team with 7 catches and 2 TDs – it is hard to tell exactly where these two teams stand in relation to each other with Stafford's uncharacteristically poor play so influential in the outcome of this game. With York already a step behind in the race for the East Division title, and Carthage likely to fall many steps behind, the eventually winner will probably be one of these two Manitoba-based teams. After dominating Virden on their home field, the Pats have to feel good about their chances.

AROUND THE EFL

With Cowtown, South Carolina and York each scoring victories, no team is winless after four weeks, but there remain two undefeated teams – one is no surprise, but the other one might be.

Some people are calling them the Markham Lucky Stars after a fortuitous series of events robbed the Spartans of a miraculous comeback at Thermopylae Stadium this week. With 4:29 left in the game, Markham appeared to be in control with a 28-13 lead. But a 57-yard completion to *Demaryius Thomas* followed by a 12-yard TD pass from *Matt Schaub* to *Miles Austin* brought the Spartans to within one score with 3:46 left on the clock. On the first play of Markham's subsequent possession *DeAngelo Williams* bobbled the ball on a pitch, *Jabaal Sheard* knocked it loose, and defensive tackle *Jason Hatcher* picked it up for a 21-yard fumble recovery touchdown. The Spartans missed a chance to tie it when Schaub threw incomplete on the two-point conversion attempt. Many thought Markham had escaped at that point. But there was more to come. With Williams' fumble fresh in his memory, *Eli Manning* attempted to "pass out" the clock, but *Marques Colston* fumbled and lost the ball at his 48-yard line. The Spartans marched to the Markham 31 where *Josh Scobee* set up for a 49-yard game-winning field goal with the wind at his back and 3 seconds left on the clock. But the usually reliable Scobee missed, sending volatile Spartans' owner **Gus Konstantakos** into his first tantrum of 2013 – a relatively minor flinging of his drinking glass at the wall and the utterance of a superlative that cannot be printed. Personally, I think the Spartans were lucky to even have a chance at victory, given the way the game flowed. But the late fumbling by Markham is a worrying sign that the Champs are a volatile team. That could cost them down the road.

At Joe Ferguson Stadium, the other undefeated team, Iowa City, reached 4-0 with a 20-0 whitewash of the Mission Viejo. *Colin Kaepernick* got the start at quarterback for the Cubs over league-leading passer *Russell Wilson* for reasons that are unclear. All **Deron Redding** would say was that Wilson, a 24-year old in his physical prime, was "tired" and needed a day off. Until this happened, I was very impressed with Wilson. Now I suspect he is just another overly coddled wimp of the younger generation. As far as I am concerned, Kaepernick might as well stay at the helm.

At the Fish Tank, the newly popular Swordfish played to a sellout crowd, which was like a victory in itself for them. Unfortunately, they were losers on the scoreboard as South Carolina, riding a 208-yard rushing performance by *Frank Gore* and 14 missed tackles by the Swordfish, hung on for the narrowest of 2-point victories, 20-18. A 16-yard touchdown catch by Sebastian's *Kenny Britt* on the last play of regulation, every bit as impressive as the one in Death Valley from *Andre Johnson*, brought the game down to a two-point conversion attempt. The usually shaky South Carolina secondary stepped up this time and broke up the pass from *Andy Dalton* in the end zone to preserve the Regulators' first win of 2013.

At the Coliseum in Gwinnett, the Gladiators won a critical battle by upsetting Garland 26-17, but may have lost the war. **Ben Roethlisberger** injured his hand while handing the ball off to rookie running back **Joseph Randle** late in the 4th quarter. The preliminary word is that Big Ben will miss at least two weeks with a severely sprained thumb on his throwing hand, meaning that **Kevin Kolb** or **Chad Henne** will take over the offence. On the other side, the loss is a setback for Garland, but the time to panic is not now. The Mustangs moved the ball well, but a pair of turnovers cost them dearly, leading to 7 Gladiators' points and taking away a red zone opportunity for a possible 10-point swing – the difference between victory and defeat.

In 108-degree temperatures at the Fiery Depths, the Excaliburs finally got in the win column with a 31-27 win over Mohave. *Lawrence Timmons* returned a fumble 45 yards for the game-winning touchdown in the 4th quarter as the Hellfire attempted to run out the clock with a 3-point lead. This was not exactly the kind of turning point **Jay Hammond** had hoped for prior to the game, but he will take a win any way he can.

The Chino Convicts stomped the Knights 41-17 at Round Table Stadium to move into sole possession of second place in the West Division. LA battled hard in the early going, fighting Chino to a 17-17 draw at half time, but a kickoff return for a touchdown by the Convicts' *Trindon Holliday* to start the second half signalled the beginning of a landslide that buried the former champs. LA coach, **Jeff Dohrn** bemoaned his team's injury problems after the game but, upon further review, they were determined to be no more onerous than any other team's injury problems, leading to the conclusion that the Knights are just bad.

Finally, the Thunder Lizards stayed one game behind Markham with an exciting 42-30 victory over the Triumph at Jurassic Park. *Megatron* was unstoppable with 10 receptions for 231 yards and 4 touchdowns. It was a little more exciting than coach **George Kaldis** expected, considering the injuries to Twin Cities' receiving corps, but all is well that ends well.

The front-runners in the West Division race face-off in a crucial Divisional match-up. These teams are statistically closer than their won-loss records. Surprisingly, the Convicts have the edge in team offence while the Cubs have a slight edge in team defence – a departure from historical precedent. Chino leads the league in points scored but 5 of their touchdowns have come from defence or special teams. Still, the offence is scoring their fair share and moving the ball at an average of 6.2 yards per play. Expect that to fall slightly this week with Vladimir Ducasse playing right tackle for an injured David Stewart against a deep and talented Cubs defensive line. On the other side, expect a return of Russell Wilson to starting QB duties in Iowa City and an offence that should be able to run the ball even if Trent Richardson can't dress. Both teams are relatively healthy, compared with the rest of the league, but the Cubs area little healthier. It will be a close one, but I have to go with the home field here. **PICK: IOWA CITY**

The Monarchs were knocked off their high throne last week by the Cubs, showing that they still have a long way to go before they can hang in with the West Division heavyweights. This week they face another heavy weight in the Undertakers. The Monarchs' have surrendered a league worst 171 yards per game on the ground but have held their own in pass coverage. But with Brandon Browner and Lardarius Webb out, they could struggle in that area as well against Death Valley's potent passing attack. The faint hope for the usually hopeless Swordfish offence is that Dalton will be able to exploit DeAngelo Hall, like the rest of the league has, *and* that his offensive line will give him the time to do so. The Glads' D has been stingy against the run so he will likely have to move the ball through the air at some point with just two viable wide receivers dressed for the game. The defence has been Markham's strength, giving up ground in tiny chunks and forcing a league-high 12 turnovers. Injuries to their receiving corps did not seem to matter last week against the best corner tandem in the league, so expect Jay Cutler to move the ball through the air against one of the worst pass defences in the league. Drew Brees-to-Calvin Johnson looks like it might become an unstoppable connection once the pair is comfortable playing together, while Reggie Bush cannot be ignored on the ground. On the other side, the Spartans' running game is leading the league and setting up passing opportunities for Matt Schaub. But with Tashard Choice out, Steven Jackson must stay healthy. The shortcomings of the defence are not a hot topic at the moment coming off a strong performance against Virden last week, but a quarterback like Philip Rivers could renew the discussion if he gets into rhythm. If he does, that rhythm had better be up tempo, because the Pats will be marking up the scoreboard at breakneck speed against mediocre talent on the Cannibals' back end. **PICK: CHARLESWOOD**

Matt Stafford faced pressure last week against Charleswood and didn't handle it well. The Hellfire have the best pass rush in the league and will bring the heat in the hottest football park on Earth. **PICK: MOHAVE**





FROM THE EFL ARCHIVES – After 3 weeks in 2007 only one team, Mohave, remained unbeaten. A 33-yard field goal by John Carney with 20 seconds left lifted the Hellfire over Gwinnett 19-17, giving them sole possession of first place in the East, followed by Florida and Gwinnett at 2-1. In the West, three teams were tied for first with 2-1 records, Anchorage, Chino, and Cowtown.

In a game that would, in retrospect, turn out to be irrelevant, the Anchorage Buccaneers outscored the Durham Thunder Lizards 31-28 in what was considered, at the time, to be a preview of the West Division final. The Dinos were

the worst statistical defence in the league at that time, and holding the Bucs to 31 points was considered an accomplishment. But only scoring 28 points against the Bucs' defence was considered a failure.

Steven Jackson of the Florida Dragons led all rushers with 146 yards and 3 touchdowns on 24 carries to lead his team to a 35-23 win over Meadowlands. The fact that he did this against the 0-3 Swamp Dogs kept him from being recognized as Week 3 Offensive MVP. That honour went to the Bucs' Joseph Addai of Anchorage, who rushed for 128 yards and 2 TDs and caught a TD pass to finish with 3 scores. At wide receiver, Mike Furrey of Cowtown was the big story in Week 3 of that first EFL season. He caught 11 passes for 187 yards and 1 TD against the difficult Knights' defence in a 24-13 win.

The pre-season favourite to win the Championship, Charleswood, finally won in Week Three, dumping Kutztown 27-24 on a Stephen Gostkowski field goal with 3 seconds left. Peyton Manning praised the media after the game.

Finally, Week 3 was notable for there being no defensive standout apart from DeMarcus Ware, who returned an interception 50 yards for a TD for the Swamp Dogs.
