ANCHORAGE – Right from the start this one had the makings of an upset. When Willis McGahee fumbled on his own 14 yard line and lost the ball on the first play from scrimmage, he gave the streaky Tony Romo the perfect set-up to kick-start another big day. Romo

stepped back on the next play and threw a dart to Larry Johnson, who made a move on Scott Fujita and burst into the end zone to signal that the Golden Bears had come to play. That set the tone for the offense as they would go on to move the ball with ease throughout the game against the league's worst defense.

The Buccaneer's offense, to their credit, was not about to let that costly early miscue distract them from their own point-scoring mission. They rebounded on their next possession to move the ball 79 yards, (33 of them on two pass interference penalties against Daven Holly), and score a major when Drew Brees found Marques Colston alone in the end zone while the Golden Bears defense hunted down Willis McGahee.

With the score tied early in the first quarter, Kutztown's coach, Pete Katsafanas, signaled to everyone that it would be "do-or-die" for the Golden Bears on this day. Facing 4th down and 2 on the Buccaneer's 31 yard line, Katsafanas kept the offense on the field instead of opting for the field goal try. The gamble failed when Romo's pass to Burress fell short, and Anchorage took over. 11 plays and 69 yards later they were in the end zone thanks to a nifty 3-yard scamper by Joseph Addai, giving the home team their first lead, 14-7.

It looked like the Buc's defense might force and 3-and-out on Kutztown's next possession when Fujita sacked Romo to set up a 3rd and long. But the Anchorage defenders, showing the sturdiness of tissue paper, left Plaxico Burress by himself along the sideline and Romo found him for 17 yards and a key first down. Two plays later, a series of missed tackles and a couple of blocks paved the way for a 38-yard catch and run

play by Larry Johnson that set up a rare TD pass to fullback, Dan Kreider to tie the score, 14-14.

Anchorage punched back with a drive deep into Golden Bear territory, but they were unable to convert a 1st-and-goal at the Kutztown 10 yard line into a touchdown, opting instead for a chip shot field goal by Matt Stover to take the lead, 17-14.

The Golden Bears started their drive to victory on their next possession – a 79-yard, 9 play series featuring a 20-yard run by Larry Johnson that got the attention of the Anchorage linebackers and opened up room for the passing game underneath. Marvin Harrison snagged a short button hook and ran it in from 9 yards to put the Golden Bears ahead for good, 21-17.

The second half began like the first half with both teams trading a pair of touchdowns each – a 19-yard pass from Romo to Dallas Clark and a 21-yard pass from Romo to Harrison for Kutztown; and a 7-yard pass from Brees to Andre Johnson and a 65-yard run by Willis McGahee for Anchorage. The fans were getting their money’s worth, but it would turn out to be window-dressing for the somewhat whacky finish to follow.

Ahead 35-31 with the ball on the Bucs 36 yard line, Romo made his only mistake of the game when he locked his eyes on his intended receiver, Plaxico Burress, and cornerback Jason David jumped the route to make the pick and give Anchorage the ball. Brees promptly led his team into field goal range, helped by a cool 27-yard pass to Randy Moss on third down, only to have the field goal nullified by a holding penalty. Facing a 4th down and 20 at the Kutztown 41 yard line with over 7 minutes remaining, Coach Fenton shocked the stadium by going for it. A deep pass to Randy moss just sailed over his fingertips and Kutztown had the ball in good field position at their own 41 yard line.

Mixing Larry Johnson runs and Tony Romo passes, the Golden Bears moved effortlessly the remaining 59 yards to the end zone, scoring their final offensive touchdown on a 4-yard pass to Larry Johnson – Romo’s sixth TD pass of the game and his second 6-TD pass performance of the season. A highlight reel 101-yard interception by Daven Holly on Drew Brees’ first pick of the year ended the scoring as the Golden Bears finished with a convincing 49-31 upset on the road.

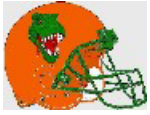

DINOSAURS NOT EXTINCT! HUNT DOWN AND DEVOUR MANNING AND PATRIOTS

PHILIP RIVERS IN FLOW OF GAME WITH GAME-WINNING TD PASS IN THIRD QUARTER

CHARLESWOOD - The Game of the Week was to feature the slashing power of Durham's "Dino-Gore" against the cool precision of Charleswood's Peyton Manning in a game some had pegged as a Championship preview. While Frank Gore posted his usual 100+ yards rushing, in the end the spotlight fell on a young quarterback who stepped up from being a "manager of the game" to taking control of the game. Philip Rivers found rookie Calvin Johnson open in the corner of the end zone at the 7:47 mark of the third quarter to put the Durham Thunder Lizards in the lead 20-17 - a lead they would not relinquish in thundering to a 33-17 whitewash of the floundering Charleswood Patriots. Rivers finished with 288 yards passing and 2 TDs, including the game winner to Johnson, to earn game MVP honours.

A disconcerted Peyton Manning attempted to rally the Patriots early in the fourth quarter, moving them down the field all the way to the Durham 12 yard line. With a field goal in his pocket, Manning went in for the kill and tried to force a short pass across the middle into tight man-to-man coverage. That's when the captain of Durham's defense, Adrian Wilson, iced the game with an interception at the 2 yard line, returning it the entire 98 yards for the back-breaking touchdown.

The game was a mere formality after that as Manning tried in vain to break through a Durham defense that smelled blood and played pass the rest of the way. A short field goal by Josh Scobee, after Charleswood failed to convert on 4th down deep in their own territory, rounded out the scoring to make the final tally, 33-17 for the visitors.

An exasperated Jason Findlay, drinking Maalox at the post-game press conference, was at a loss for answers to his team's early season struggles. Although 3-3 may not seem like a slump for some, the Patriots - the early favourite to win the East Division - had higher hopes and higher standards for their talent-laden roster. "We aren't getting rewarded yet for all the hard work during practice and the pre-season. We're not getting any breaks and we are facing some highly motivated opposition. We've just got to execute better, on both sides of the ball," he said while filling out questions on a Wendy's job application.

CHINO - The inmates were restless after a Convict beatdown on the road in Cowtown last week. Gwinnett and Chino both sported 3-2 records under the lights on a special Friday night edition of EFL football. In the first half, the game was an offensive slugfest with both teams scoring at will, torching the defenses.

All week, on the local sports radio airwaves, talk around Chino was that Cutler was going to get the start over the slumping McNabb, but McNabb silenced his critics and had a solid day, leading the Convicts. Chino opened up an early 14-3 lead thanks to two TD passes from McNabb, one to favorite target Boldin, the other to Holt. Gwinnett then kicked it into gear, as Palmer found Wayne and Gonzalez at will, shredding the Convict secondary. Parker capped off to impressive drives with 33 and 7yd TD runs, Gwinnett, lead at the half, 24-21. After half-time festivities, Chino took over, well, Tomlinson took over.

LT would add two more TD runs in the second half, along with his one TD run in the first half, to give him 3 touchdowns on the day. The capper was a 78yd run over left tackle to put the game away in the fourth quarter. Chino eked over the 500 total yard mark for the game, but gave up 437 to a solid Gwinnett squad.

“We’ve been at home every week until this one,” Gladiator coach, Dave Birdsall stated. “Of course there is an adjustment to make. We certainly missed the bowls of grapes, the hot tubs and the hand maidens at half time. I mean what gives with the armed guards outside of our locker room?! But that’s no excuse. We are all professionals and we need to pick it up. We’re on the road for a while now so we better get used to it.”

MEADOWLANDS – The Swamp Dogs continue to look for that elusive first win of the season. Settled comfortably at home with a new starting quarterback in Jason Campbell, the fans were optimistic that something special would happen to raise their team from the swampy muck of mediocrity. For a brief moment following Justin Miller’s electrifying 1st quarter kickoff return for a touchdown it looked as if the Swampies’ boat would rise with a tide of home field enthusiasm. FLORIDA - The afternoon was calm and the temperature moderate for Dragonmount stadium as both teams took the field. According to the league famous Smucker projections, neither team was expected to challenge this season. However, the Cubs have played the role of the dragon slayer by beating both Cowtown and Anchorage in upset victories, and nearly taking down Durham. On the other hand, while the Dragons have handled teams with less than stellar records, they have faltered when tested by teams with elite quarterbacks.

Both clubs got off to slow starts as each offense sputtered in the red zone and settled for field goals. The Dragons failed to convert a Losman first period fumble to any points when they elected to go for it on 4th and 1 inside the Cubs 20 yard line. Little did the fans know this would be the last time the Cubs defense would show up for the next two quarters. At the end of the first period, it was 3-3 and

beginning to look like a stalemate.

Early in the second period, Florida would take their next possession in for 7 to make the score 10-3, but more importantly to set up the Dragon defense for a reign of terror. The Dragons would proceed to tee off on Iowa and deliver brutal defensive hits, which resulted in 2 recovered fumbles and a pick during Iowa's next 3 attempts at offense. Just as a way of welcoming the Cubs to Dragonmount, the defense would also add a couple of sacks. The Dragon offense would then strike quickly to put up two touchdowns and a field goal with many thanks to the defense. The next time Coach Redding's squad got the ball it was 27-3 Dragons and 3:51 to play. The Dragon D laid off and protected the deep ball only to have Cubs nibble their way across the 50 yard line. The Dragons then made what could have been a huge tactical error. On a 3rd and 10 with 23 seconds left in the half, the Dragons risked a double team, hoping against hope to deny Iowa a late field goal. Jeff Garcia was able to find Lee Evans all alone deep and put 7 points on the board with 4 seconds to play in the half. The Cubbys were back in the game, but kicking off to Florida to start the 3rd quarter.

After a nice return by Figurs, Brady would complete his first pass to Cotchery, but his second pass was completed to the wrong team. Fortunately, the black and whites would uphold a Florida challenge as the Iowa DB did not properly secure the catch as the ball touched the ground and was ruled incomplete. It spelled the end for the Cubs. Steven Jackson would take over for the offense and run like a male bull elephant in heat, leaving Iowa defenders flat footed on his way to 151 yard effort. The Cubs could not call the correct defense to slow him down. Florida would score 14 more unanswered points before putting in their second string for the 4th quarter. The Cubs would also throw in the towel in the 4th quarter giving some of their youngsters a chance to play.

Although Tom Brady would be named the game MVP for his 4 TD effort, 3 by air and 1 by ground, the game ball went to the Dragon's newly named defensive coordinator KOCH. Koch was able to fire up the defense, which resulted in 4 turnovers and 5 sacks. Coach Heaton was asked about Tom Brady's performance and commented "Tom is a good quarterback this year, but after he gets this year under his belt learning the new offensive scheme, he has the talent to be one HELL of a quarterback next season! I can hardly wait."

KNIGHTS GO TO HELL IN MOHAVE – DROP 5TH STRAIGHT GAME TO FALL TO 1-5

KNIGHTS DEFENSE BEDEVILLED BY MARC BULGER'S 4 TD PASSES

MOHAVE – 113 degree heat has a way of making everything seem worse than it is. But in the case of the LA Knights, their Week 6 game against the Mohave Hellfire was as bad as it seemed – not because they were blown away or overmatched against the EFL's East Division powerhouse, but because their fifth straight loss signaled the possible demise of their playoff hopes before the season had even reached the half way point. Standing at 1-5 and in sole possession of last place in the West Division, the Knights are in critical condition and they know it. A gritty performance by the much maligned LA offense, scoring 20 points on the road against an elite defense, was all they could have asked for from David Carr. The Knights defense threatened, but failed to bite down on the Hellfire offense, allowing them to post a

steady stream of points that the Knights offense could not match. A turnover going back the other way was a luxury they needed to have and did not get.

IT WAS OVER WHEN: Hellfire QB Marc Bulger fired a touchdown pass, his fourth of the game, to Laveranues Coles with 1:43 remaining. Facing a run-heavy defensive front on second and ten from the Los Angeles 16 and leading by seven, Coles found a seam in the zone, slipping by Nnamdi Asomugha to paydirt. It was Coles' third score of the afternoon, to go with 97 yards in six catches. Bulger posted 290 passing yard against one the league's toughest pass defenses.

GAME BALLS: Mohave's Brian Westbrook tallied 157 all purpose yards in his return from a strained quad and Terrell Owens caught four passes from Bulger for 103 yards. The Hellfire defense was stout all day, sacking Los Angeles QB David Carr six times and forcing two fumbles. But DE Trent Cole gets the defensive game ball for his ten tackle performance that included two stuffs and a pass deflection.

KEY STAT: Despite losing the turnover battle 3-1, Mohave won 3rd down on both sides of the ball, converting at a 60% rate while allowing just 2 of 11 conversions to Los Angeles. It would be the key to the game as Los Angeles was turned away in the red zone three different times in the game, accumulating just six points on those trips.

NOTEWORTHY: David Carr was very efficient against possibly the best pass defense in the league, logging a 106.9 rating for the game. It was his early efforts that kept the game tight throughout. WR Terry Glenn also had a fine game, catching seven balls for 100 yards and one touchdown. Los Angeles won control of the clock, outlasting Mohave by almost five minutes but the Hellfire struck deeper with their attempts, out gaining LA by almost 130 yards.

Odds-makers seem to be piling on the Bucs and their rice-paper defense with this healthy double-digit point spread. Add the Convict's all-world offense led by LaDanian Tomlinson and Donovan McNabb and the fact they are at home and the situation looks grim for Tony Fenton's Buccaneers.
