

MOHAVE – After a torrid 4-0 start to the season, Mohave coach **Bobby Elder** is feeling the heat. At home to the Division-rival Kutztown Golden Bears, with a chance to gain the upper hand in a tight race for a wild card spot, the Hellfire hearth went cold in the second half, igniting a 3-touchdown Kutztown rally over an 8-minute span in the 4th quarter. The resulting loss was the 5th in a row for Mohave and their 8th loss in 10 games since taking the league by storm to start the season. Prominently featured in early MVP discussions, Hellfire QB, *Matt Schaub* has been inconsistent since Mohave's 4-0 start and may have jeopardized his team's season in this game by throwing 3 critical interceptions that sparked the Kutztown comeback.

It was all Mohave at the beginning. A 22-yard pass to *Braylon Edwards* on 3rd & 8 got the Hellfire into the red zone on their first possession then a personal foul on *Richard Seymour* salvaged a 3rd & 15 to put them on the 12 with a fresh set of downs. *Rashard Mendenhall* scored on a 5-yard screen pass three plays later to put Mohave in front 7-0. Mendenhall continued his hot start with a 63-yard run to set up a 19-yard *Rob Bironas* field goal to make it 10-0. The Hellfire took a 17-0 lead after *A.J. Hawk* picked off *Tony Romo* at the Mohave 6 then rode *Jerome Harrison's* 43-yard run to build a 94-yard scoring drive that ended in a 1-yard TD leap over the top by Harrison. All was looking good for the home team at that point; but with less than 2 minutes remaining in the 1st half, *Ike Taylor* picked off Schaub and returned it 20 yards to the Mohave 23. Romo found *Greg Jennings* for a 4-yard TD pass one minute later to put the Bears on the board and put a brake on the developing rout.

The Hellfire notched a field goal midway through the 3rd quarter to make it 20-7 then stopped the Bears on a 4th down gamble at the Mohave 23 early in the 4th quarter. That appeared to put them in the driver's seat with a 13-point lead and 13 minutes remaining in the game. However, with Schaub facing 3rd & 10 at the Mohave 43, Bears' corner, *Tracy Porter* picked off a pass intended for *Terrell Owens* and returned it 15 yards to the 37. After two incomplete passes, *Felix Jones* took the Hellfire 'D' by surprise with a 10-yard run for a first down on 3rd & 10 to keep the budding drive alive. Kutztown continued to run the ball until Romo found *Brandon Pettigrew* open in the end zone from 10 yards away for a TD to pull within 6 points. The fired up Bears swarmed *Andre' Davis* on the ensuing kickoff, holding him to a 9-yard return from the goal line. With poor field position, Mohave managed just one first down before punting, giving the ball back at the Bears' 42. Romo went into action, completing all 5 of his pass attempts, including a 17-yard TD strike to Jennings, to lead his team to the go-ahead TD. Trailing 21-20, Mohave took over at their own 35 yard line and came close to field goal range after Schaub completed a 17-yard pass to Edwards at the Bear's 36 on 4th & 10. But on the very next play, *Tracy Porter* stepped in front of an errant Schaub offering and returned it 67 yards for the game-clinching TD to complete the comeback.

KNIGHTS RUN OVER YORK

GAME POINTS: The Knights rushed for over 200 yards as a team and got a big play from one of their defensive stars in dispatching the fading York Excaliburs and staying in the running for the final wild card playoff spot in the PAC. York came out strong in the early going as **Pierre Thomas** rushed for 35 yards and caught 2 passes for 17 yards, including a 4-yarder for a TD on their opening drive to take a 7-0 lead. But the game turned around in a hurry after **Charles Woodson** picked off **Tom Brady** early in the 2nd quarter and returned it 48 yards for a TD to give the Knights 10-7 lead. LA started to pull away after that with a 10-point flurry before the half that featured a 47-yard run by **Cedric Benson** to set up a 16-yard TD pass from **Kurt Warner** to **Steve Smith**. **David Garrard** replaced Brady in the 2nd half but he could make no headway against the vaunted LA defence, playing shutdown with a lead, and the Knights went on to win easily.

<u>KEY PERFORMANCES</u>: **Kurt Warner** completed 18 of 24 for 152 yards and 2 TDs, **Cedric Benson** rushed for 124 yards on 20 carries, **Shonn Greene** rushed for 80 yards on 111 carries: **Tom Brady** went 9 of 17 for 88 yards, 1 TD and 1 INT.

DRAGONS JUST TOO MUCH FOR HAWKS

GAME POINTS: Two lost fumbles slowed down the Dragons in the 1st half and led to an early Ringgold TD on a 23-yard pass from **Ben Roethlisberger** to **Andre Johnson**. But the Dragons kept moving the ball on offence while the "Firewall" held their ground in the red zone and the Dragons went on to log their 14th win of the season against no losses. After playing to a 10-10 draw through 2 quarters, the Dragons started to slowly pull away from the Hawks on their second possession of the 3rd quarter. **Jonathan Stewart** gained 37 yards on 4 straight carries, the last a 6-yard TD run to put Florida in the lead to stay. An **Aaron Rodgers** lost fumble gave the Hawks a FG but on the Dragons' next possession Rodgers hit **DeSean Jackson** in stride on a short slant that the speedy receiver turned into a 47-yard TD. The 11-point lead held as the teams traded FGs to finish off.

KEY PERFORMANCES: Aaron Rodgers completed 27 of 40 for 322 yards and 2 TDs, **DeSean Jackson** caught 7 passes for 109 yards and 1 TD, **Jonathan Stewart** gained 63 yards and 1 TD on 10 carries; **Ben Roethlisberger** went 14 of 27 for 203 yards and 1 TD, **Andre Johnson** caught 4 passes for 75 yards and 1 TD.

GARLAND DIGS "D"EEP FOR RARE WIN

GAME POINTS: The Mustangs defence forced 4 turnovers and made plays in all facets of the game to hold the Gladiators to just 3 points and win by 4 TDs despite a mere 12 first downs and 216 yards of total offence. The Garland secondary was credited with 10 passes defended while the pass rush got to **Eli Manning** for 3 sacks, 4 hurries and forced 4 QB fumbles. **Ted Ginn Jr.** kicked off Garland's day by returning the opening kickoff 96 yards for a TD. After the teams traded field goals, Garland jumped into the dominant position with a pair of quick TDs – the first by **Frank Gore** on a 6-yard pitch and the second directly off Gwinnett's next possession when rookie **Earl Thomas** picked off Manning and ran it back 52 yards to pay dirt. The Glads missed their last good opportunity to get back into the game when **Brian Cushing** forced a Manning fumble on the Garland 5 yard line in the 3rd quarter. The Mustangs galloped the rest of the way.

<u>KEY PERFORMANCES:</u> Matt Ryan went 16 of 22 for 173 yards and 1 INT, Brian Cushing made 15 tackles, 1 sack, 2 stuffs and 3 FFs, **Dominique Foxworth** defended 3 passes; **Eli Manning** went 20 of 36 for 209 yards, 1 INT and 3 fumbles.

PEYTON PREYS ON VIRDEN

<u>GAME POINTS:</u> Peyton Manning became the first QB to reach 30 TD passes this season with a 15-yard scoring strike to **Bernard Berrian** in the 3rd quarter that put the Pats up 38-0 over the shell-shocked Violators. It was Manning's 4th TD pass of the game and 3rd TD pass in the 3rd quarter; all 3 set up by Virden turnovers. The Violators were never really in this game after **Marques Colston** streaked 35 yards for a TD to make it 14-0 Charleswood in the 1st quarter. But the wheels came off for the visitors when **Ricky Williams** fumbled on the Pats' 33 yard line on their first possession of the 2nd half. Colston was in the end zone 8 plays later for his 2nd TD of the game and the rout was on. **Adrian Peterson** scored bookend TDs, running it into the end zone from 8 yards on the Pats' first possession and punching it in from 1 yard to cap off the scoring in the 4th.

ANOTHER DAY, ANOTHER RECORD FOR C.J.

GAME POINTS: Chris Johnson broke a run off tackle for 88 yards and his 27th rushing TD of the season, an EFL record, to give the Spartans a 34-3 lead in the 3rd quarter. Johnson's personal and team highlight was the low point of the day for a beleaguered Durham squad that brought little fight to their home field against their division rival. Pickering was able to move the ball almost at will on the ground and through the air and went into half time leading 20-0 after an end zone interception of Philip Rivers by Asante Samuel kept Durham off the board on their most threatening drive. The Dinos turned the ball over 4 times, leading to 13 Pickering points, 6 of those on a 28-yard fumble return by Brian Dawkins in the 2nd quarter. Durham has turned the ball over 9 times in their past 2 games, both losses, sliding to 9-5 as Pickering clinches the North Division.

MARKHAM CLINGS TO PLAYOFF HOPES

GAME POINTS: Joe Flacco and Zach Miller hooked up for an 18-yard TD pass midway through the 2nd quarter to break an early stalemate and give the Corn Kings a 7-0 lead. It was a short-lived advantage as Markham responded with a gruelling 16-play drive, keyed by four 3rd down conversions that ended 6:49 after it had started with a 10-yard TD pass from Jason Campbell to Kenny Britt. The 2nd half was dominated by Markham as they stopped the Corn Kings' offence and posted 10 points with their own. The winning score came one play after Shaun O'Hara covered up a DeAngelo Williams fumble on the Cowtown 19 yard line; Chad Ochocinco reeled in a javelin from Campbell for a TD and a 14-7 lead as the Stars' offensive line fought off a blitz. Trailing by a TD, back-up QB Matt Moore threw away Cowtown's final hope when he was picked off by safety Tyrell Johnson with 1 minute remaining in the game.

BRADFORD GIVES CHINO "FITZ"

GAME POINTS: Sam Bradford tossed a short flare to Larry Fitzgerald that he turned into an 11-yard TD pass to open the scoring for the Cubs at The Big House. With Donovan McNabb out, Jay Cutler was in charge for Chino. The young back-up could not get the offence rolling early, leading his team to just six 1st downs, 96 yards and no points in the 1st half while falling behind 10-0. However, the Convicts erased that 10-point deficit quickly on their first two possessions of the 2nd half: a 26-yard pass to Anthony Fasano helped set up a 3-yard TD run by Steven Jackson then, after the Cubs' Ellis Hobbs fumbled the kickoff return, Jeff Reed booted a 3-pointer from 33 yards out to tie the game. Iowa took back the lead when 3 straight completions to Fitzgerald put them in range for a 42-yard field goal by Neil Rackers. But the turning point of the game came after Joshua Cribbs returned the ensuing Cubs' kickoff 62 yards, putting the Convicts in field goal range before they had run a play from scrimmage. Cutler connected with Hines Ward for 12 yards but Chris Gamble stripped the ball and Demeco Ryans gathered it up and ran it back 91 yards for a TD and a 20-10 Cubs lead. Jackson got Chino back within a field goal single-handedly with a big 61-yard run followed by a 1-yard TD plunge. The teams sparred for the balance of the 4th quarter until Gamble made his 2nd big play of the day - intercepting Cutler and returning it 34 yards to the Chino 1 yard line with little over 1 minute left. Bradford then snuck the ball across the line to put the game out of reach.

KEY PERFORMANCES: Sam Bradford went 17 of 22 for 184 yards and 1 TD, Larry Fitzgerald caught 9 passes for 101 yards and 1 TD, Mario Williams made 5 tackles, 1 sack, 1 FF and 5 QB Pressure; Jay Cutler went 18 of 36 for 178 yards, 2 INTs and 2 fumbles. Steven Jackson rushed for 139 yards, 2 TDs, on 22 carries.



Ryans, and cornerback Chris Gamble. In truth, that part was not really a complete surprise – the Cubs' 'D' has had their good moments this season and Cutler can be a complete boob at times. The shock of Week Fourteen was the performance of rookie QB, Sam Bradford in one of the league's most inhospitable road climates.

Coming off an injury last week against Gwinnett and an automaton-like showing in Florida the week before that, Bradford looked poised in the pocket this week and took what the "Lockdown Crew" gave him. He avoided getting sacked, did not turn the ball over, and threw for 184 yards and a TD in a 27-17 Iowa City win. For a guy who wasn't even supposed to play after being helped off the field versus Gwinnett last week, it was a heroic effort and worthy of a little "Hollywood-style" applause.

DAMN RIVERS!

While *Sam Bradford* grows into a man in front of the nation's eyes, Durham's *Philip Rivers* is regressing to the "blanky" and thumb-sucking phase. After getting his ass spanked Patriot-red at Charleswood in Week Thirteen, Rivers responded with a tantrum and was given a timeout by his coach against Pickering at Jurassic Park in Week Fourteen. This is not the time for a quarterback meltdown but it appears that is exactly what Durham coach, **George Kaldis**, is being forced to deal with as the regular season winds down.

The back-to-back tests against two of the league's powerhouses was widely regarded as an opportunity for the Lizards to shake off the stigma of "third best" they have had to endure for most of the season after a slow start involving an opening day loss to Markham and losses to Florida and Pickering

through the first five weeks. The Dinosaurs rebounded with a 6-game winning streak that they brought to Charleswood for their showdown with *Peyton Manning* and the Pats. Rivers was quoted before that game:

"We see ourselves as the best team. Our goal is to win the Championship. We know we can score every time we have the ball and that's what we expect from ourselves. Our defence is peaking at the right time. I'm peaking. Markham attained their pre-season goal of 6 wins with a 17-10 victory over Cowtown. The North Stars were looking to punish the Corn Kings for taking a chunk out of them in Week Three, but as far as "revenge" games go it was a tame affair. The highlight of the game was a 22-yard run by *Jahvid Best* to get the Stars into range for their final field goal to make it a two-score game in the fourth quarter. Thrilling!

Garland shocked Gwinnett 31-3 at The Corral. It was a banner performance by the Mustangs' defence; so impressive that the Professional Football Writers Association (PFWA) issued a memo to its members to refrain from referring to the Garland's defence as "Thoroughdeads" until further notice, or at least until next week when they get run over by Florida.

New ownership in Ringgold was not enough to inspire the Crimson Hawks to overcome the odds against the Dragons. Florida added another win to their league-leading total, riding the fleet feet of *DeSean Jackson* and a tough red zone defence to a 27-16 win. With two games remaining against sub-500 teams, the Dragons look to have their perfect season all but wrapped up with a bow. His 27^{th} came on an 88-yard sprint to give the Spartans a 34-3 lead over Durham in the third quarter. Yes, that's right – *third* quarter. More damage could have been inflicted but the Spartans had made their point and backed off. If there is somebody else in the race for EFL Offensive MVP, will somebody *please* tell me who he is?



Jimmy's Week FIFTEEN picks

MOHAVE @ CHARLESWOOD (line – PATRIOTS by 12)

The Hellfire had the game in hand last week versus Kutztown and let it slip away – their 8th loss in the last 10 games since beginning the season 4-0. At 6-8 and sliding down a mudslide towards the fiery pit of post-season torment, there remains faint hope for redemption. Yes, the devil's pitchfork can be stayed from its sadistic prodding with a Mohave victory in this game – although it would guarantee nothing – keeping them alive for another week. If they lose and LA wins, they are out. If they lose, but Iowa City wins, they are still alive, but precariously so. The Pats control their own destiny for the top seed in the PAC – all they have to do is win their remaining two games. They are the hottest team in the league over the past 4 weeks since getting strangled at the Big House by Chino in Week Ten. Peyton Manning and Adrian Peterson were absolutely dominant last week against Virden. Yes, the Violators have a terrible defence, but that defence was coming off a heroic effort against the league's top offence in Pickering the week before. Both teams are missing their starting right tackles but otherwise have clean bills of health. KUTZTOWN @ VIRDEN (line – Pick 'Em)

The Bears can clinch a playoff berth and eliminate Virden with a win. The Virden playoff scenario is a little dicier — they must not only win their final two games but also hope that Mohave and LA lose their final two games and York beats Iowa City in the final game of the season. Not very good odds at all, but still; they are odds. With the game at **TERRORDOME** it is certainly possible that Virden will hold up half of their end of this improbable playoff scenario. Although coming off a sub-par performance against the Pats last week, Drew Brees is still a commanding presence on the field and you can count on him persevering in spite of the adversity. The Bears' defence is almost completely healthy again (Aaron Smith is 'Questionable') and their pilfering ways were evident last week in their comeback win over Mohave. In the end, it will come down to Tony Romo taking aim at the Virden secondary and Kutztown's defence slowing down Brees by generating turnovers. MARKHAM @ DURHAM (line - THUNDER LIZARDS by 7)

What is going on in Durham? Certainly 2010 has not turned out to be the kind of season they were envisioning at the beginning, but in their last two games they have looked like a very bad team; not a good team going through a rough period. The Pats rocked them hard in Week Thirteen and the shock carried over last week against the Spartans. Philip Rivers was eventually pulled and Brian Brohm inserted to try and salvage some team dignity. That didn't go so well and now the team and their fans appear to be in a panic. But things are not really so horrible for Durham in the big picture – they are guaranteed a playoff berth and are locked into the 3rd seed. Now they can work out the kinks in their game plan against the weak sisters in the North Division; Markham and Cowtown. However, the North Stars, at 6-8, are still in the playoff picture. This means that they will bring their 'A' game to Jurassic Park. Whether they will actually *play* their 'A' game, or forget it on the team bus, remains the usual unanswerable question one has to ask before betting for or against Markham each week. The EFL's most passive-aggressive franchise has no major injuries to report, meaning that their starters are on the hook for their performance on Durham's wet and unnatural field. I like Markham here. Not to win, but to keep it close. **PICK: MARKHAM**

COWTOWN @ PICKERING (line – SPARTANS by 18)

Vegas' biggest line this year may not be nearly big enough. The Spartans have the advantage in every phase of the game except for punting – an area the Corn Kings will get to focus on a lot in this game. On top of simply being much better, Pickering is hot right now, coming off a 37-6 thumping of Durham. The biggest challenge for Gus Konstantakos will be in developing a game plan that apportions sufficient scoring plays for his many offensive stars – *prima donas* all of them – so that they remain happy and their agents can assemble highlight footage for future contract negotiations. Chris Johnson could gain the 227 yards he needs to break the EFL single season rushing mark in this single game. It's not merely possible, it is a betting prospect at 10-1. While I am not ready to bet on that, I am ready to place a large wager on the ancient warriors to shred the spread. **PICK: PICKERING**

GARLAND @ FLORIDA (line – DRAGONS by 13)

Florida can clinch the top seed in the Can-Am Conference with a victory while Garland can drop another draft position if they find a way to pull off the biggest upset in professional football history. No, I am not over-dramatizing it – a Garland win would be the biggest upset in pro football HISTORY. True, the Mustangs shocked Gwinnett last week in an unlikely fashion – with an inspired performance by their defence. But while that might bode well for the long term future of the franchise, the future *right now* remains fairly bleak when matched against the league's best franchise over the past three years. While the Dragons can expect to win comfortably, do not bet on a blowout. The Mustangs have quietly improved their standing in both team defence and offence while competing for the league's worst record. They are better than their record and they are starting to show some pluck as the season winds down and they are no longer burdened by unreasonable playoff expectations. Okay, I have painted as pretty a picture as I can for Garland fans, For the hardcore bettors out there, take Florida and the points. **Pick: FLORIDA**

LOS ANGELES @ IOWA CITY (line - Pick 'Em)

The effects of the Knights' shaky season have reverberated in places like Iowa City, where the 5-9 Cubs remain alive in the playoff hunt because teams that were supposed to have eliminated them by now, such as the Knights, have not. LA can get the job done, preventing post-season play by the Cubs for the first time ever, with a win at chilly Joe Ferguson Stadium. A win and a Mohave loss would put the Knights in the post-season and make Week Sixteen academic. But winning in Iowa City is far from a certain prospect for the unpredictable Knights, especially now that the Cubs believe they can win. Deron Redding's team shocked everyone, including themselves, with a strong 27-17 win on the road against West Division top dog, Chino. The strength of the Cubs is their defence, led by Mario Williams, Demeco Ryans and turnover king, Jairus Byrd. If the Knights were not so prone to turnovers I might discard that factor, but LA has turned the ball over 27 times, good for second worst in the league after Durham. The Cubs beat Chino without much offence and if they can do that on the road, they are capable of the same thing at home against the Knights. It is time for Kurt Warner to step up and show why the Knights gave up some of their future for him. With the young Cubs riding an emotional high, however, it may prove too difficult even for the imperturbable vet. **Pick: IOWA CITY**

CHINO @ YORK (line – CONVICTS by 8)

The Excaliburs are out of the playoff picture and the Convicts have clinched the West Division title. But those two facts do not make this game a meaningless one. Chino is competing with Charleswood for the top seed in the PAC while York is trying to stop an 8-game losing streak and finish the season on an optimistic note. Okay, I admit that's not much incentive for the Swords, considering that they can only be hurt by losing another position in the upcoming draft. Nevertheless, the idealistic and, some say, stupid fans at Camelot will be cheering lustily for the kind of legendary upset that will fuel a heroic mythos heading into next season; when they expect Tom Brady will be fully recovered from the mental injury of being released by Florida after winning a Championship and will lead them to playoff glory. Meanwhile, the Convicts will start Donovan McNabb. He will resume control of the team from Jay "the Punk" Cutler, who succeeded in regressing the Chino offence a full year with his error-filled performance last week against the Cubs. For that reason and many others too numerous to list here, Chino will beat down the Yorkies with embarrassingly plain, sadistic glee; as do all bullies to unfit weaklings. **Pick: CHINO**

RINGGOLD @ GWINNETT (line – Pick 'Em)

The Gladiators face elimination from the playoff race this week and for their tragically suffering fans it is about time. No team, except perhaps for the team they are facing this week, has disappointed optimistic hopes as much as Dave Birdsall's team has done. The difference between Gwinnett and Ringgold is that the Crimson Hawks look poised to enter the post-season in spite of themselves, while Gwinnett looks like they are going to pay the price for their mistakes. This is the way it looks now, but it can change entirely with a Gwinnett victory over Ringgold. Should the Gladiators win and the North Stars lose, it will be a free-for-all in Week Sixteen to decide the final wild card berth in the Can-Am Conference. The level of competition after the top three teams is so exceedingly mediocre that, for all the wrong reasons, anything is possible in the 2010 race for the final wildcard berth. The Gladiators were embarrassed last week against Garland while Ringgold lost honourably against Florida. The momentum appears to be in Ringgold's favour as well as the numbers. The Hawks are 5th overall in offence and they face the 12th ranked defence in the EFL in Gwinnett. The Glads' offence has been hot and cold all year, resulting in a #9 ranking. They could as easily be shutout by Ringgold's 10th ranked defence as they could hang 30 points on them. Both teams are unpredictable at the best of times, but a closer look at the injury list provides a clue to the eventual outcome. Corey Webster and Domata Peko are out for the Hawks and Brodney Pool is listed as 'Doutbful,' while Oshiomogho Atogwe is listed as 'Probable' for Gwinnett.
